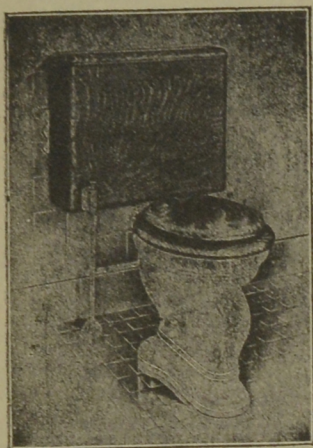

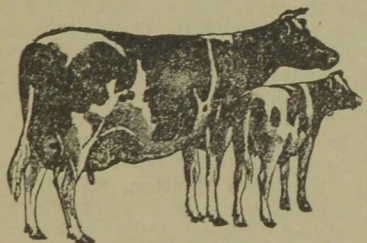

**TO USE BULLET
AS A NARCOTIC**

Washington, April 1—The painless blowing off of one's arm during war time, the human shooting of wild game on hunting expeditions and the simple operation of firing the specially prepared bullet into the head of a fleeing burglar, to have him run a few yards further and then go off into peaceful slumber, is what a Pittsburg scientist hopes for a medically-treated bullet with which he is experimenting.

He hopes to have the United States government adopt the bullet for army use. He is trying to get the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals to recognize its merits and then induce sportsmen to adopt it. He later will give the police chiefs of the country a few boxes to experiment with.

The new compound, the "narcotic bullet," is the invention of Alexander F. Humphrey. Experiments are being conducted by a committee of army officers, police officials and sportsmen. It is considered alike humane in warfare and deadly in hunting big game. In self-defense it provides the poor marksman with all the advantages of an unerring aim.

In his sleep-producing missile, Humphrey uses a minute particle of morphia. The drug is carried in tiny wells in the steel jacket of the regulation army bullet.

Humphrey claims that it is no wise interferes with the effectiveness of the missiles. The slight indentation in the steel jacket, he says, causes no splintering when it comes in contact with the bone. The wound of the narcotic bullet, according to his theory, does not differ from that caused by the regulation bullets now used in the approved army cartridges. No deleterious effects will follow the unique administration of the drug.

The soldier, receiving a slight flesh wound from the new bullet, fights no more than day, he calmly stretches himself on the ground and goes to sleep. The man receiving a serious wound suffers no agony, as the narcotic from the bullet is absorbed by his system and he is insensible to pain before he reaches the hospital.

The man whose wound is mortal sleeps his last hours, thus doing away with most of the battlefield horror. The fleeing burglar is shot in the arm, runs forward a short distance, stretches himself on the sidewalk and all the policeman has to do is to summon an ambulance and haul him away. The big game hunters, Humphrey says, will feel no fear of a counter-stroke from a wounded tiger, a lion or grizzly bear. Although the bullet may make but a slight wound, the game is as good as bagged, once it is struck.

The schedule of the proposed harness meeting at the Panama-Pacific Exposition calls for two harness race meetings, the first in June 1915 of 11 days and the second a 13 day affair; in October. For these two meetings purses and stakes amounting to \$225,000 are to be paid.

**CANADA'S TRADE REACHES
BILLION MARK**

Ottawa, March 31—Though of course official figures are not yet available the Canadian financial year which ends to night, will, it is expected, be shown to have eclipsed all records of the country's prosperity.

It is estimated that final figures will show trade aggregating about \$1,000,000,000, of which imports for domestic consumption will total about \$850,000,000 and exports of domestic produce \$350,000,000.

The trade increase is in the neighborhood of 25 per cent.

Government expenditure will total about \$154,000,000. It is under tood that the Hon. W. T. White's budget speech will show substantial expansion of the revenue in every department. The date of the speech depends on the passage of the West Indian trade agreement, as some tariff adjustment is necessitated by the agreement.

**INTERIM DIVIDEND
ON MONTREAL TRAM**

Montreal, April 2—An interim 5 per cent. has been declared on the paid up capital of \$2,000,000 of tramways stock and it was further announced that a new issue of \$1,000,000 stock at par would be made immediately. The interim dividend of 5 per cent. on the common stock is believed to be preliminary to placing the stock on a settled dividend basis, and the street recently has heard gossip of a ten per cent. annum rate and higher.

**MAY SUMMON BISHOP
TO THE WITNESS-BOX**

Montreal, April 1—The Ste. Made de Monnoir College of St. John's is again in the limelight.

Last summer the priests of the college obeyed the orders of Archbishop Bruchesi and disbanded. This, however, did not settle the claims of Mr. C. S. Edwards for \$100,000 which he held against the college, and when the college assets were transferred to Bishop Bernard of St. Hyacinthe, Mr. Edwards took civil action against the Elshop.

In March, 1912, a rogatory commission was appointed to examine Mgr. Sbaretti in Rome, a decree promulgated while he was in Canada, which ordered the wiping out of the corporation of the College of Ste. Marie de Monnoir, transferring the assets to the episcopal corporation of St. Hyacinthe.

C. S. Edwards, who had a claim of \$100,000 against the college, applied to the Superior Court for a stay in the order of dissolution by Mgr. Sbaretti, and as he could not have any order given to the delegate, who was acting only in his canonical capacity, the order was addressed to the priests forming the corporation of the College of Monnoir, which had a civil as well as a canonical charter. The order enjoined the priests not to comply with the decree of Mgr. Sbaretti before they had given security for the \$100,000 claimed by Mr. Edwards, and it was addressed to Mgr. Bernard, the Bishop of St. Hyacinthe, to give such security before liquidating the assets of the college.

As the allegations of Mr. Edwards were contested by Mgr. Bernard a rogatory commission was appointed to examine Mgr. Sbaretti in Rome, and a Roman lawyer named Ligotti was appointed as commissioner. His report, received yesterday, was that Mgr. Sbaretti had refused to be examined, as his decree was of a character absolutely canonical, in which the supremacy of the church was absolute and the interference of the state could not be entertained.

**MONTREAL POWER
HAS BANNER YEAR**

Montreal Light, Heat and Power Company—with an explanation of the recent "dip" to a low since June last—is dealt with in this week's circular sent out by J. C. Mackintosh and Co., who say in part:

"The Street has been trying to account for the drop in the price of Power by looking for causes outside of money market conditions. In this effort, up to the present, no success seems to have been experienced. Conditions in connection with the Montreal Light, Heat and Power, so far as can be learned from reports of the company itself or from hearsay evidences from those closely related to the company, are all that can be desired. Unquestionably, the company has never been so strongly entrenched before as it is at the present time. For many years rivalry was constantly going on between the Montreal Light, Heat and Power and other concerns which sought to enter the field in competition for street or private lighting. The company also experienced some difficulty with one of its hydraulic developments, and its efforts to secure other economic water powers were believed not to be very successful. In the end, after years of negotiations and diplomacy the company now finds itself in absolute control of the power situation in Montreal.

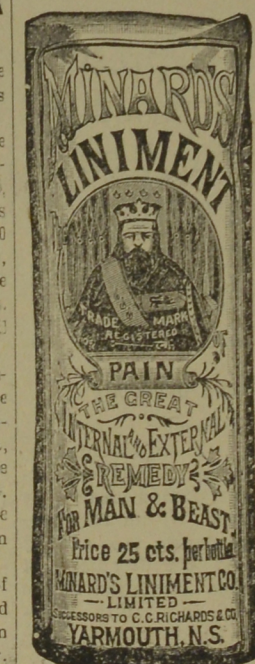
