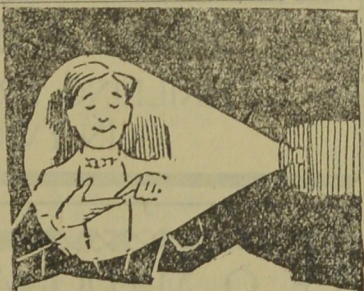
To the electors of Ward No. 2.

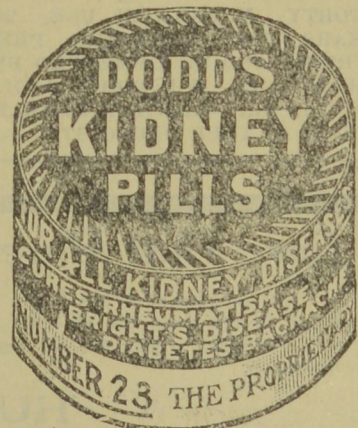
