There were great doings at the ball yard yesterday afternoon, three scraps, an accident to a player and the general paning out of the umpire being mixed up with an alleged bad game. Bangor the tailenders trimmed the Fredericton leaders 10 to 3. Fortunately the Pets got going in the sixth and bunched four singles with the result that three runs came in and a shut out was averted.

Umpire LaBelle was called upon to give some close decisions and all went against the home team with the result that the players and fans alike grew riled. It is probable that an effort will be made to have LaBelle removed on account of poor work.

The ump gave a couple of decisions against Fredericton in the first that displeased the crowd. Matters came to a head in the third inning when after Wildes fled out to Bert White the latter threw to the plate in time to put Dolan out, that player trying to score from third on the throw. LaBelle declared Dolan safe. Murphy jumped for the umpire and pushed him back. For this he was sent to the bench. There was a big holler over this. Bob Ganley and the umpire exchanged a few remarks. The ump made some explanatory statement to Bob which drew in response the scathing rebuke "Don't try to be pulling that old sympathy stuff."

In short "Hi Hi, the ump" was in bad all around. In the sixth inning when Fredericton was doing its best to score, the ump pulled what looked like a very raw one striking Stone out on a ball just above his ankles. This made the second put-out for the inning and the Pets after that scored their runs.

### KEANEY IN LIMELIGHT

The third inning was full of "pep" after Murphy had been chased for shoving the umpire around. Keaney came into prominence. Reed when stealing second spiked the Fredericton shortstop and a scrap with Keaney doing most of the leading. Players, the umpire and finally the police restored order and cleared the field. In the second part of the third spasm Catcher Wakefield of Bangor received a swift ball in the throat above his protector. He was painfully hurt and was forced to retire, Brooks replacing him.

### ANOTHER ROW

In the fifth Tewhey of Bangor enlivened proceedings by getting in a mixup with Stone, the latter after Murphy was chased by the umpire going behind the bat, P. J. Duggan to first base and "Pete" Condon to left field. The row followed an interchange of words but was of short duration.

### FREDERICTON'S OFF DAY

Umpire LaBelle's decisions certainly helped Bangor get its start but apart from them the visiting team had the better of the game. The Pets had an off day and it was to be expected after seven straight wins. Keaney's fight with Reed seemed to have spoiled him for the balance of the game for he had as many errors as he ordinarily has in two or three weeks. Dederich was batted hard and was taken out in the third Woodcock going in. Bangor also got to him. Fredericton hit Ruper quite freely but the hits were scattered.


