YOUNG SMITH
WILL GO BEFORE
JUDGE WILSON

County Court Will Deal With His Case---To Be Sent to Boy's Industrial Home at St. John

Young Frank Smith, who was sentenced to three months in jail on Monday last for robbing the store of J. J. Weddall & Son, but whose sentence was allowed to stand will appear before the Police Magistrate tomorrow morning on a remand to face the charge of robbing the dwelling of Richard Wickett. He will be sent by the Police Magistrate to Judge Wilson of the York County Court and by him will be committed to the Boys' Industrial School at St. John.

This is considered to be the best disposition that can be made of the boy, who up to the present time has proven incorrigible and entirely beyond parental control.

A statute exists under which a county court judge can send a boy to the Industrial School the cost of maintenance to be charged to the Municipality and by it recovered from the parents if they are able to pay. If York County had its own industrial school which can be established under law the police magistrate could commit to it himself.

King was convicted of obtaining \$22,000 under false pretences from persons who had entrusted him with funds for investment, and was sentenced to a term from tentofourteen years.
