WAR ON PACIFIC THE
LAST MIGHTY CLASHSecond Coming of the Lord to Follow
Says an Evangelist---World Getting
Worse Says Dr. Walter Russell at Tor-
onto, Prophecy of Timothy is Fulfilled

(Toronto Globe)

That this world is bad and is quickly going from bad to worse, that the masses are lovers of pleasure and not lovers of God, and that the present state of the world was predestined and can only be remedied to a degree by the churches, is the view by Dr. Russell, the noted Chicago evangelist, who preached in Toronto yesterday. In an interview with The Globe last evening Dr. Russell freely offered his opinions on the effect of evangelistic effort and its prospects. He painted a gloomy picture of the fate of this world as viewed from the evangelist's platform and declared that he was a "trist" rather than a pessimist.

Dr. Russell said the hope of evangelizing the world cannot be realized until after the coming of the Lord. He does not think the world shows any sign of getting any better—that is taking the masses as a whole. Nor would he expect it. The present wicked ways of the average man, he says, were prophesied in II. Timothy 3, and it would be a contradiction of the Bible if things had not developed as they have.

He quoted the following from that chapter in support of his contention: "This know also that in the last

days perilous times shall come, for men shall be lover of their own selves, covetous, boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to their parents, unthankful, unholy, without natural affections, trust-breakers, false accusers, incontinent, fierce, despisers of those that are good, traitors, heady, high-minded, lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God, having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof."

THESE THE LAST DAYS

"Certainly," came the reply. "These are the last days of the ages and believe it is all going to close with the nations testing their arms on the Pacific waters. I think Japan will mobilize the forces of the Orient and there will be a mighty clash. It will be the final climax, and convulsions over the earth will demand his coming. There will be no peace until Christ has come again. The war dogs of the earth are now crying for blood. Great Britain, Germany and the Great nations of Europe today are standing in peril of each other. The firing of a pistol, I believe, would set them all in a panic. Oh no, the days of universal peace are not here, nor can they be brought about by Hague conferences. There will have to be a great conflict first."

Dr. Russell wished to emphasize the fact that this should not be cause for too great discouragement to Christians. It merely means that the Divine prophecy is being realized and the ungodly state of the world now is indication that the end is near, and Christ's coming cannot be far off. Where he bound to admit that the people of little or no faith are increasing their majority at an alarming rate, he said it was also true that the comparatively small army of real zealous, spiritually-minded people is increasing. Here he ventured the opinion that "American Christians are a more livelier and more deeply spiritual class than those professing to be workers for Christ in Canada. In this country Church people work and worship conventionally, and lack, he believes, the ardor and fervor of their American co-workers."

WAS WITH CROSSLEY AND
HUNTER

Dr. Russell is a Canadian by birth and is known to many in Toronto from his association with Crossley and Hunter at the time of their revival in this city ten years ago. He is now a member of the Chicago Presbytery, and is engaged largely in evangelistic work in that city, although he still makes tours of parts of the western states conducting series of meetings.

The prospect for evangelism of the old revival meeting type, he thought, is not very bright. The people do not seem to want it as in the old days. The great mass revivals conducted in large cities in the last half century have not shown permanent converts failed to connect themselves with churches, and many were never heard of again after giving a testimony. That method of evangelization had not made good, said he. What is called "denominational evangelism" has been a greater success. But even this kind of work is on the decrease. The evangelists are unable to stand the severe physical strain, and many go into institutional work in cities, while others have lately turned into new lines of enterprise. Dr. Russell said that only yesterday he met three once successful evangelists who are now engaged in the real estate business in Toronto.

Dr. Russell occupied the pulpit yesterday morning in Trinity Methodist Church and last evening in the Metropolitan Church.

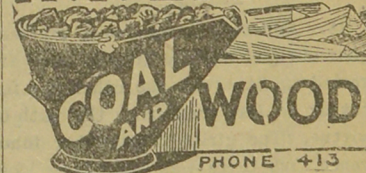
