erty," he declared. "It is only a question of gravest indiscretion."

Andrew Bonar Law the opposition leader said that his party had no desire to drive the ministers out of public life. The opposition had not pushed the charges vindictively, so the ministers alone were to blame for the situation which had arisen. When the country found after their speeches in October, that the ministers had been dealing in "Marconi" shares, the country was astonished and angry.

"The party opposite," said Mr. Law, "has always made the claim to special virtue, the attorney-general said yesterday that the government's standard was the higher. In the circumstances the claim was not altogether appropriate."

SIR EDWARD GREY

Sir Edward Grey concluded the debate. He said:

"If the motion of the opposition were passed it would mean that the political career of these two members is ended forever. If there was corrupt or dishonorable conduct they ought to go, but there has been only carelessness. This house ought not to pass any motions that could be regarded as a vote of censure. Everyone admits that an earlier complete acknowledgement should have been made of these transactions."

The secretary continuing said that the house should do everything in its power to relieve the ministers of the injury done them by the charges of corruption bandied about the country, although he declared, nothing that it did could right all the wrongs they had suffered.

1768—William Finlay, who as governor of Pennsylvania did great work in developing the anthracite coal fields, born in Mercersburg, Pa. Died Nov. 12, 1846.

TO PAINT BRIDGES

Messrs. E. C. Colby and L. F. Gates of Ottawa arrived here today. Mr. Colby is managing director of Concrete Constructions Limited of Ottawa and Mr. Gates is connected with the same firm. The latter has a contract with the Provincial Department of Public Works for sand-blasting and painting the steel highway bridges. Two crews are to be brought to the province one to work from Edmundston and the other from Charlo, Restigouche County. The cost will be \$25,000 to \$30,000 per year. The crews are now in the province.

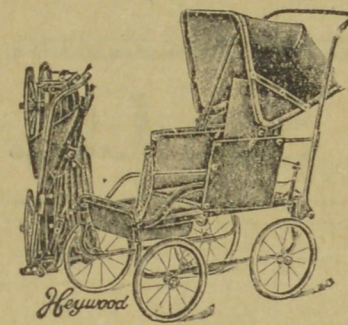
