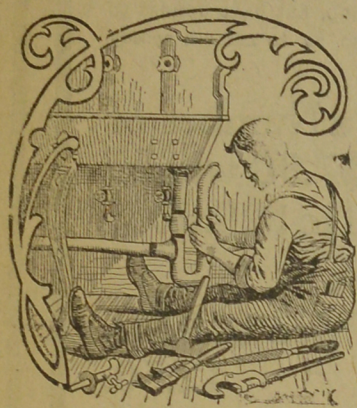

At a recent parlor meeting the following reports of departments were read:

Mrs. Ruth Mackinnon, who some nine years ago was appointed Superintendent of the Lumbermen and Raftsmen's work, one of our earliest departments, first taken up in the "Y" branch by Miss Amelia Moore, has through the devotion of much time and care, made it a success beyond expectation. The literature collected, viz., secular and religious papers and magazines, tracts, Bibles and hymn books, have been supplied. The papers and magazines alone have totalled 127,750 pages. Several letters of thanks and appreciation have been received and answered by our painstaking director.

Mrs. F. L. Olmstead, superintendent of the "Frances Willard Home Fund," has, during nine months of last year, sent 1,610 Surprise Soap coupons. She is much interested in the work, and still solicits the coupons.

Mrs. (Rev.) S. A. Baker, of the Flower, Fruit and Delicacy Mission, to the sick and lonely strangers in hospital as well as elsewhere, is still busy in her much loved department. She is supplied with a monthly sum for procuring whatever needs may exceed gratuitous supplies from interested persons.

Mrs. (Rev.) J. J. Colter, superintendent of Militia, says her work among the soldiers has, this year, been more encouraging than ever before. The men have more heartily responded to interest on their behalf. Sixteen have signed the total abstinence pledge, one of whom was recently baptized and joined the Methodist Church. Two of them possessing literary gifts have prepared and read before the Epworth League, interesting papers, one on the life of Lord Roberts, the other on that of Capt. Scott, both of which papers were published in the local press. Two of the boys have renounced the tobacco habit entirely. If only the canteen could be abolished the soldiers would soon regain all they have lost of their better manhood. The Methodist parsonage was the first home in the city to open its doors to those lonely boys away from home and friends, exposed to temptations well fitted to wreck their moral and social character, for an evening social given by some of the ladies of the church. The superintendent of the department with her husband, assisted by the ladies, also entertained on another evening, all of which they thoroughly enjoyed.

WARNINGS TO GIRLS

"Forewarned is Forearmed"

The presiding officers of the Girls' Friendly Society of Boston, the aim of which is protection and prevention of evil, have been asked to give this warning to girls at the different public meetings at which they preside.

We must face the fact that there are bad women attempting to lead young girls into sin as well as there are good women who are doing all they can to keep girls good and pure. Therefore, we want most earnestly to warn you to be on your guard against strange women as well as strange men, no matter how attractive they may be or how they may appeal to your sympathies.

1—Girls should never speak to strangers, either men or women, in the street, in shops, in stations, in trains, in lonely country roads, or in places of amusement.

2—Girls should never ask the way of any but officials on duty, such as policemen, railway officials, or postmen.

3—Girls should never loiter or stand about alone in the street, and if spoken to by a stranger (whether man or woman) should walk as quickly as possible to the nearest policeman.

4—Girls should never stay to help a woman who apparently faints at their feet in the street, but should immediately call a policeman to her aid.

5—Girls should never accept an invitation to join a Sunday School or Bible class given them by strangers even if they are wearing the dress of a sister or a nun, or are in clerical dress.

6—Girls should never accept a lift offered by a stranger, in a motor, or taxi-cab, or vehicle of any description.

7—Girls should never go to an address given them by a stranger, or enter any house, restaurant, or place of amusement on the invitation of a stranger.

8—Girls should never go with a stranger (even if dressed as a hospital nurse) or believe stories that their relatives have suffered from an accident or have been suddenly taken ill, as this is a common device to kidnap girls.

9—Girls should never accept sweets, food, a glass of water or small flowers offered them by a stranger, neither should they buy scents or other articles at their door as such things may contain drugs.

10—Girls should never take a situation through an advertisement or a strange registry office without first making inquiries through a society active or affiliated in travel.

GIANTS PAY \$10,000 FOR SUPERIOR PITCHER

Superior, Wis., June 18—"Rube" Schauer, the sensational pitcher of the Superior Club of the Northern League, was sold today to the New York Nationals for \$10,000, delivery to be made Aug. 15. Dick Kinsella made the deal for the Giants after watching Schauer on the present road trip. Schauer leads the league in strike outs, has pitched three one hit games this year and was robbed of a no-hit performance by a scratch with two out in the ninth inning. He is playing his first year in organized baseball, having joined the Superior team as a recruit this Spring.

The price of \$10,000 is the highest ever offered for a minor league player except in the cases of Marquard and O'Toole.

Charley Jones has been released as manager of the St. Paul Northern League team. Catcher Lizzette has been placed in charge of the team.
