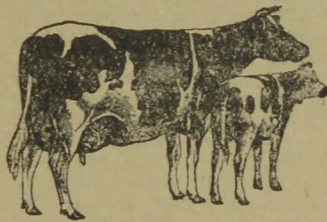

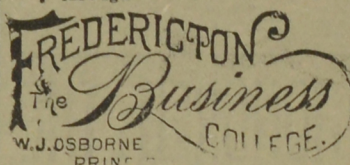

city on receiving the society's gold medal commemorating his achievement. Captain Amundsen then said that a friendly rivalry had existed between Captain Scott and himself, but that they always had in mind the best interests of the scientific research in which both were engaged. He felt that the two British explorers, Shackleton and Scott, had done much to assist him by preliminary research in the antarctic regions and had blazed the way for the discovery he ultimately made.

It was Captain Amundsen's belief that Captain Scott had reached the south pole and had been delayed on his return for the purpose of gathering scientific data.

WILTED SCHOOL MARM
GETS \$1,450 AWARD

Worcester, Feb. 10.—Lena M. Bates, the Phillipston school teacher, won a verdict of \$1,450 in her breach of promise suit against her old playmate, W. Leroy White, formerly a Boston attorney. The jury was charged by Judge Charles F. Jenney in the Probate Court and returned a verdict in two hours.

The cross suit which White brought against Miss Bates, and in which he asked for only nominal damages, was also decided in favor of the young woman.

During the testimony of Miss Bates some tender passages from letters alleged to have been written by White were read:

"Now I know the dear arms that are waiting to nestle around my neck. I can hardly wait to see you again," was one excerpt.

Then again:

"I would like to show my appreciation with a show of kisses."

Mr. White is again alleged to have written:

"How I love to hold her in my arms again, for each time the fire of love grows brighter."

This last passage was followed by a string of "kisses," thus * * * Several passages were read speaking definitely of the wedding and urging that it take place quickly. "Do you think that I can ever forget yesterday? 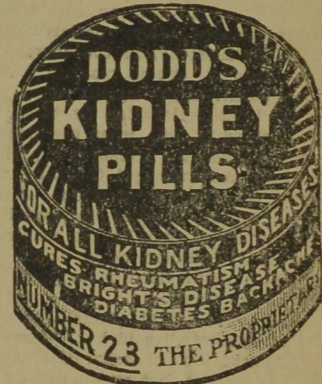
NO SEAT, NO FARE,
IN CHICAGO CARS

Chicago, Feb. 10.—It was learned today in connection with the introduction of a "no-seat no-fare" ordinance, that 3,000,000 persons annually qualify as "strap-hangers" in this city. This is at the rate of 190,000 each day, of whom 75,000 regularly forego the luxury of seats during the rush hours.

It is calculated that the enforcement of such an ordinance would cost the street car companies \$1,500,000 a year.

It is declared that not enough cars could be run into the business quarter during rush hours to accommodate all passengers with seats.
