nickel, the timber and the coal. It would mean permanent and profitable employment for thousands upon thousands of skilled artisans in ship-building and the allied industries, and," Mr. Pardee added, amid laughter and applause, "as a solace to honorable gentlemen opposite, it may be added that it would do much to build up the home market upon which they seem to be depending."

"It will be a sad day for Canada if she secures the right to have her say as to whether England shall go to war or not."

Mr. Pardee said that it was significant that there had been no contradiction from the government side of Mr. Cookshutt's statement that the policy of contribution would be the permanent policy and that Canada would be called upon to make a contribution every year.

The announcement that Germany and Britain have reached an agreement to preserve the present proportion of their armaments meant the end of the race for greater armaments, and the extinction of the German war scare. He closed with a declaration of Canadian self-reliance as the greatest contribution to imperialism.

LABOR AGAINST WAR

Alphonse Verville, the Labor member from Maisonneuve, said that organized labor like farmers, churches and many societies had declared against war. Their declaration against war was not, however, a declaration against a proper provision for police protection.

Speaking for organized labor, he said: "We favor providing ships to guard our own coasts and protect our avenues of commerce." He predicted that the end of war scares had about been reached. The labor men were beginning to speak, and to make themselves heard. The forty-one labor members of the British parliament and the 110 labor members in the German reichstag during the past few years have produced great changes in the attitude of the governments of those countries on all questions. The workmen of England of Germany, of France and of Switzerland had declared that hereafter before war is declared they must know why it is undertaken and if it shall be approved or hereafter they would not permit any of these countries to plunge into war to satisfy the whim of any group.

If an effort is made to declare war between these countries the workmen of such countries will go out on general strike and make the operations of war in which they have not been consulted absolutely impossible. They had given a demonstration of their capacity to do this. A short time ago the German government threatened war over the Moroccan situation. What happened? One hundred thousand workmen in the city of Berlin made a hostile demonstration against this proposal of the German government and there was no war.

Secondly by Mr. Robb the Liberal member of Huntington, he concluded by moving a second amendment to the Borden proposals, declaring: "That the consent of parliament should not be given to this resolution until it has been submitted to the approval and has received the assent of the electors of Canada."
