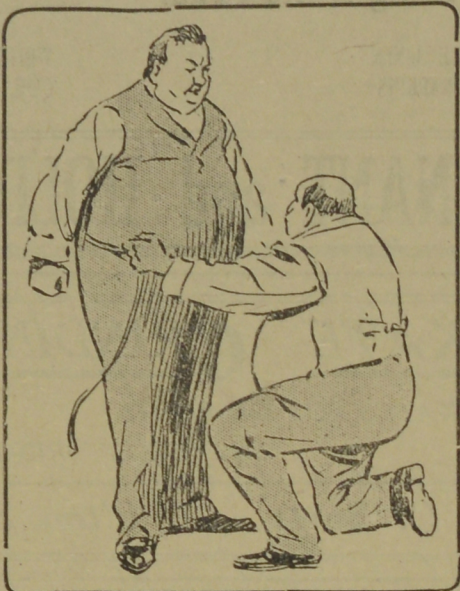

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## Magnificent Weather For Inter-City Matinee Racing

### CHATHAM LOST TO CRESCENTS 6 TO 4 IN HARD-FOUGHT GAME

"Bunky" Robinson Not Satisfactory as Referee---Chatham Kicked and Crowd was Sore---Very Slack With Offsides---Game was Fast and Rough---Fred McLean Played Good Hockey for Chatham

Marysville Crescents won from Chatham 6 to 4 last night in a game of hockey which was marked by rough play and by some weird refereeing by Frank Robinson of Marysville, who, when he figured on the Marysville Crescent team some years ago was known as "Bunky" Robinson. It was his first appearance as referee and he got in bad with the crowd which gave Chatham increasing support as the game went on. Referee Robinson was criticized chiefly because of slackness in the matter of offside play and also for the manner in which he imposed penalties. Marysville escaped with a total of three minutes of penalty, Fred Wade being the solitary offender. Chatham served twenty minutes altogether and during the second half had two men off the ice at once on several occasions.

#### GAME WAS FAST.

The game was fast although marred by continued offside play with Crescents the worse offenders. Chatham showed up much better than they did against U.N.B. the night before. Their forwards did better work, though not attempting much combination. Flood, who did very little against the College team, showed a big improvement. Bellevue and Veno were the same. Fred McLean was at right wing for Chatham and his skating and stick-handling were features of the game. Synott at coverpoint, covered lots of territory and helped his forwards out often. Watling played a very similar game and checked hard and often as George Brogan learned. In goal, "Tart" Titus was the "old reliable" once more.

#### MARYSVILLE PLAYED HARD.

Marysville played hard and their forwards even if they did take advantage of the referee's laxity in the matter of offside play, were in the game from start to finish and all played good hockey. Irving Wade's shot was working well, he scoring half of Marysville's goals. The two Hoveys also figured in the scoring and with MacMorris played good hockey. On the defence both Brogan and Fred Wade were prominent at all stages, although the latter did not get in so any rushes as he generally does. In the net Robinson pulled off some first class stops and in general put up a good game.

#### MARYSVILLE TOOK LEAD.

Marysville drew first blood and early in the game ran away with Chatham, making the score 5 to 1 before the visitors got going. Chatham then scored three times in rapid succession and made the score 5 to 4 at half time. The only goal of the second half was scored by Marysville.

Referee Robinson penalized McLean just before this and Synott backed into a corner refusing to continue the game. His team-mates did not support his protest however and play went on, Marysville scoring.

Crescents had Chatham going at this point and Gordon Hovey scored soon after, the Marysville forwards rushing the puck down and a scrimmage taking place in front of the Chatham net.

Brogan got the next after I. Wade had carried through the Chatham team and passed to him, the play was one of the best of the game.  
Marysville, 4; Chatham, 1.  
Crescent forwards continued to

press Chatham hard and Irving Wade scored again after a combination rush by Marysville.

Marysville, 5; Chatham, 1.  
Chatham then pulled themselves together and made matters interesting. Bellevue followed the rubber behind the Marysville net and passed out to Flood who scored on a long shot.

Marysville, 5; Chatham, 2.  
Bellevue scored himself three minutes later putting in a good shot after a combination run.

Marysville, 5; Chatham, 3.  
From the face off Chatham forwards took the puck to the Marysville end and Flood scored.

Marysville, 5; Chatham, 4.  
The second half was hard fought and close and it was well toward the close that Irving Wade scored Crescents' last goal.

### NATIONAL LEAGUE HAD HARMONIOUS ANNUAL MEETING

Action on Schedule Deferred Till Today  
---Change Made in Rule Regarding Umpires

New York, Feb. 11—Peace and harmony prevailed at the opening session of the adjourned annual meeting of the National League of baseball clubs here today. The business transacted varied little from the usual routine and outside the rooms such talk of "deals" as was heard was for the most part vague in character and lacking in authority.

After a brief meeting of the board of directors the National League club owners held a session of scarcely an hour's duration and deferred action on the playing schedule until tomorrow when they expect to get through with the remaining business of the annual meeting.

The directors decided that hereafter when any National League club shall take an umpire from President Lynch's staff the club will be required to reimburse the league with whatever amount the directors may deem sufficient for the loss of the umpires services. President Lynch announced his selection of umpires for the coming season as follows: R. W. Emslie, W. J. Klem, Charles Rigler, Clarence Owens, William Brennan, Al Orth, M. W. Eason and W. J. Guthrie and W. J. Btyon, both of whom were with the International League last year.

President Lynch said that President Johnson has assured him the American League would not negotiate with Hank O'Day is the National League desired his services. The former manager of the Cincinnati club was expected here today but President Lynch said he had not heard from O'Day and if the latter consents he will be added to the list of umpires making the tenth man on this year's staff.
