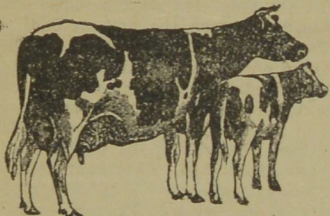

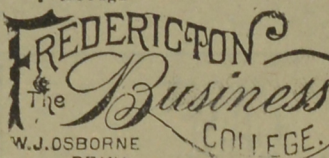

THE WORLD'S NEWS
IN SHORT METRE

Washington, D. C., Feb. 15.—Bids
will be opened at the Navy Depart-
ment Tuesday for the construction
of the new battleship Pennsylvania,
the largest fighting machine yet de-
signed by any navy. Without armor
and guns, the Pennsylvania, with a
displacement of 31,400 tons, will cost
\$7,425,000. The total cost of the
vessel will be close to \$12,000,000.

President Taft, in recognition of
his services in behalf of universal
peace, is to receive a gold medal at
a testimonial reception and dinner
to be held in New York City Friday
evening. The dinner will be under
the auspices of the American Peace
and Arbitration League and will be
participated in by representatives of
thirty-three peace and civic organi-
zations throughout the country.

President Taft has also accepted
an invitation to attend the annual
meeting of the Washington National
Masonic Memorial Association, which
will be held in Alexandria, Va., at
the end of the week. The association
is composed of the grand masters of
the various Masonic jurisdictions in
the United States and has for its
object the erection of a permanent
temple to Washington the Mason.

Tuesday will be inauguration day
in France, when M. Raymond Poin-
care will be formally installed as
President of the Republic. In recog-
nition of the popularity of the new
President, it has been decided to
make his inauguration an occasion
for a general fete day, with popular
festivities throughout the country.

The Joint International Waterways
Commission will hold a meeting in
Detroit Monday. The principal sub-
ject to be brought up will be the
Livingstone channel in the Detroit
River. The population of boundary
waters will also be discussed.

Stock brokers throughout the United
States and Canada are to hold a
convention in New York the latter
part of the week to form the Inter-
national Brokers' Association. The
chief aim of the association will be
to put the public on its guard
against get-rich-quick schemers who
call themselves brokers and deal,
largely by mail, in securities that
are absolutely worthless.

Saturday, the anniversary of the
birth of George Washington, will be
observed as usual as a public holi-
day, throughout the country. In the
capital the leading feature of the ob-
servance will be the annual reading
of Washington's farewell address in
the Senate. Senator Brandegee of
Connecticut, has been designated to
read the address.

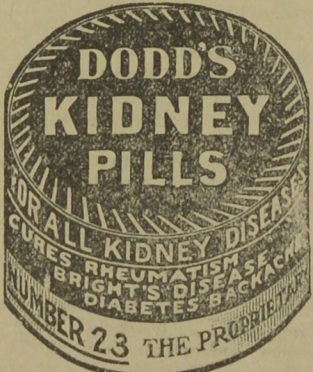

ALBERTA LEGISLATURE
HAS LARGE PROGRAM

Edmonton, Alta., Feb. 11.—The
speech from the Throne, delivered
with customary ceremonial at the
opening of the fourth session of the
second Legislature of Alberta at 3
o'clock this afternoon, predicts leg-
islation for an increase of the num-
ber of judicial districts, the contin-
uation of a policy for the building of
a system of highways, additional
sums for the extension of the tele-
phone system to portions of the
country not yet reached and provid-
ing assistance to meet the require-
ments of the farming communities in
regard to the shipping of grain and
the economical handling of crops. It
also points out the need of legisla-
tion covering acts for the formation
of co-operative companies, making
uniform and workable contracts for
the sale of farm implements, improve-
ment of the workingmen's compensa-
tion act, formation of economical
schools, and establishment of the
principle of direct legislation.

The speech concluded with the re-
gret that "the promises of the Fed-
eral authorities in regard to the
handing over of their natural re-
sources to the Prairie Provinces have
not yet been implemented in the
slightest degree; although requests
for conferences on this question have
been made, no time has yet been fixed
by the federal authorities, and I
bring this matter to your attention
for such action as you may desire to
bring in the interests of the Prov-
inces of Alberta."

SHOULD CHILDREN

STUDY AT NIGHT

Should boys and girls be required
to study in the evening? At present
almost all schools, both public and
private, arrange their schedules so
that it is, or seems to be necessary
for the pupils to do some hard
work of preparation at night. This
in the cases of children at day
school not only entails hard work
in the evening on the part of the
boys and girls, but also, to some
degree, imposes work on the part of
parents. Against their practice The
Ladies' Home Journal has directed
its extensive influence. In its issue
for January it gives two pages to
the discussion of this matter by pub-
lic school principals and superinten-
dents and by a physician. The opin-
ions there expressed are in general
agreement with the views of The
Ladies' Home Journal. The physi-
cian, Dr. Winthrop Talbot says:

"When the growing tissues are
wearied they must be given a chance
to regain tone and vigor, or they
will suffer strain. The plastic body
more easily suffers lasting injury
than the adult body. Sleep is
necessary for it. What are the con-
ditions which induce sleep? A brain
relieved of high tension, it is true,
but also a body freed from active
heat production. Every young mam-
mal normally toward evening will
suckle or eat, but not gorge, then
play awhile—a natural diversion of
blood pressure from the brain—and
then settle itself to quiet sleep. With
the young human mammal that
should be the usual procedure. So
by evening study we systematically
proceed to allow our boys and girls
to follow methods of working
which definitely defeat the purpose
we have in mind—namely that they
shall be kept in the highest degree
of efficiency."

One school principal reports that
as a consequence of forbidding "the
children in his school to take home
their text-books, "except in the high-
est two grades," it was found that
the children progressed more rapid-
ly and satisfactorily. Parents were
advised that they should have their
children devote the evening hour to
reading on subjects correlated to
their school work. Such reading
helps the pupils to advance, but it
does not involve the strain on nerve
and mind that hard study in pre-
paration for recitation and examina-
tion involves. This part answers the
question, How shall the children be
occupied in the evening? A still
better answer is that they may take
their time for practice that requires
not mental strain but manual dex-
terity, such as piano practice, indoor
games in winter, or outdoor games
when the weather permits.
