(1) A Bill authorizing the City to grant certain concessions to the Palmer-McLellan Company, Limited, and to fix the valuation of the property of Fraser's Limited in this City for taxation purposes.

JEWISH ORDER MEETING  
AT SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, Cal., Feb. 15—The district grand lodge of the Independent Order of B'nai B'rith, the great Jewish fraternal and charitable organization, will begin its annual session in this city tomorrow. The session will be attended by delegates representing branches of the society throughout California, Utah, Oregon, Washington, Montana and British Columbia. A large part of the meeting will be devoted to a celebration of the lodge's fiftieth anniversary.

The Independent Order of B'nai B'rith is the most representative and influential organization of the Jewish people, having grand lodges in every part of the United States, in Austria, Germany and Roumania and in addition, a system of affiliating lodges in the Orient.

The order was started many years ago by American citizens of German birth, who had emigrated to the United States to better their condition and who, finding many obstacles in their pathway, concluded to inaugurate an organization that should be of help to the incoming immigrant and to educate him within the precincts of the lodge room to higher patriotic ideals, to care for the widows and orphans and for the distressed everywhere and to protect and defend the politically and religiously persecuted. The order has built and endowed orphan homes in San Francisco, Cleveland, Atlanta, New Orleans and other cities. It has also technical and manual training schools and is aiding and supporting educational and philanthropic enterprises everywhere.

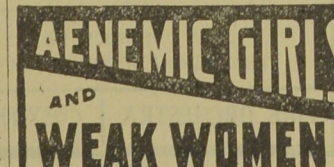

HON. W. S. FIELDING ON  
BORDEN NAVAL POLICY

London, Feb. 12—Hon. W. S. Fielding replies this morning to the allegation made in The Daily Telegraph on Monday that he had been working in close association with several Radical members on this side to defeat Borden's naval proposals when they were introduced in the Commons. He points out he has no disposition to be drawn into a discussion on the Canadian naval question, and that the report gives him credit he doesn't deserve.

The naval proposal of Sir Wilfrid Laurier presented to the Canadian Parliament in his recent speech, he says, is the expansion of one which with my cordial co-operation he adopted several years ago, and which was first set forth in a resolution unanimously passed by the Canadian Commons and thus became the policy of the whole Canadian people. That unanimity, come to, I may say, by friendly negotiations by leading men on both sides of the House was to my mind the most valuable feature of the movement. Naturally I prefer that policy to the new one of the present government, the merits of which I don't wish to discuss here but which if adopted can only be the policy of one political party in Canada.

"I thought I could do anything to secure the adoption of the Laurier naval policy or of some compromise measure which would again bring the whole Canadian people together on this great Imperial question. I would be happy to do it for I cannot believe the Canadian naval policy to which one-half of the people of Canada refuse assent can bring any real strength to the Empire. But, as I am not aware of anything I can do in that excellent direction. I am content to leave the question to other hands."

## LIEUT.-GOVERNOR BULYEA.

George Headley Vickers Bulyea, Lieutenant governor of Alberta, was born in Gagetown, N.B., February 17, 1859. He graduated from the University of New Brunswick in 1878 and drifted into mercantile pursuits. He removed to the west and in 1891 was an unsuccessful candidate for the Northwest Territorial Council. He was elected to the territorial assembly in 1894 and was re-elected by acclamation on accepting office in 1897. He was then non-resident member of the Haultain-Ross executive council. Mr. Bulyea was appointed Yukon commissioner for the territorial government in 1898 and was re-elected by acclamation in 1902 and next year he became commissioner of public works for the territories. In 1903, when Alberta was erected into a province, Mr. Bulyea was appointed first Lieutenant governor. He is now serving his second term.

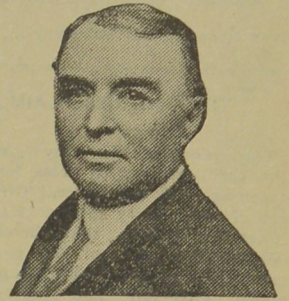

## WORLD'S CHAMPION SKATER

New York, Feb. 13—In view of the extraordinary popularity that the sport of ice skating is enjoying at the present time, considerable surprise and some disappointment are expressed by lovers of the sport over the fact that the United States and Canada have not seen fit to send some of their star performers to

compete in the world's figure skating championships this year. The championships are scheduled to begin today in Vienna under the auspices of the Eis club of Austria which this year is celebrating its twenty-fifth anniversary. Since 1890, at St. Petersburg, there has been no American representative so far as fancy skating is concerned in Europe.

Figure skating originated in Holland and in 1660 was introduced into England by royal exiles returning at the time of the restoration from Holland, when they brought the Dutch roll. In Scotland the Edinburgh Skating Club existed in 1742. In America figure skating was an institution in Colonial days and in 1772 Benjamin West, the painter was a skillful skater and during a visit to England he captivated the Londoners with his graceful gyrations on the serpentine
