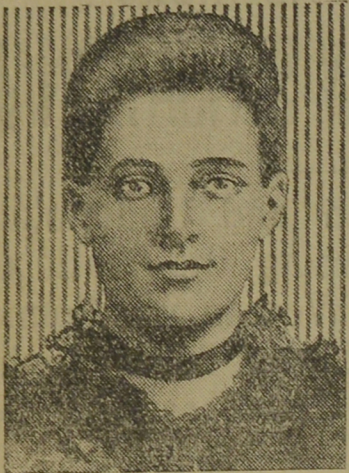

TO LOCATE—T. W. Bell is here negotiating for the purchase of the Capt. Whittier cottage at the corner of Church and George streets. Mr. Bell intends to remove his family here from St. John.

RIVER SERVICE—The steamer Florenceville after a very good season has had to suspend her trips for the present. The Clifton a "four-by-niner" is doing service on the river between this city and St. John. Like the wind no one knows whence she comes or where she goes and no one seems to care.

consider necessary; also para. 956 K. R. & O 1910 with reference to sale of intoxicating liquors in camp.

Transport Requisitions (14)—Warrants with full instructions, including hours, etc., for entraining, have been sent to the O. C. Squadrons. Officers in command of Squadrons will be held responsible that correct returns are promptly submitted.

Marching-in-States (15)—Marching-in-states have been sent to the O. C. Squadrons. These are to be correctly filled in and handed to the adjutant, immediately on arrival at Camp Sussex.

Liquors (16)—The sale of intoxicating liquors within camp limits is strictly prohibited.

Hair (17)—O. C. Squadrons will be held responsible that the hair if N. C. O.'s and men under their command is closely cut.

Instructions (18)—O. C. Squadrons must instruct their officers and N. C. O.'s of their command in all essentials of their respective ranks both from K. O. & 0 and memo for Camps of Instruction. All Squadron books must be kept properly written up.

St. John Men and Horses (19)—Men and horses leaving from St. John must be at railway station at 7.30 Tuesday morning, June 24th. Capt. J. S. Tait will be in charge of the entraining.
