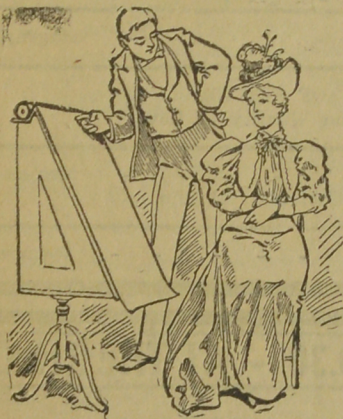

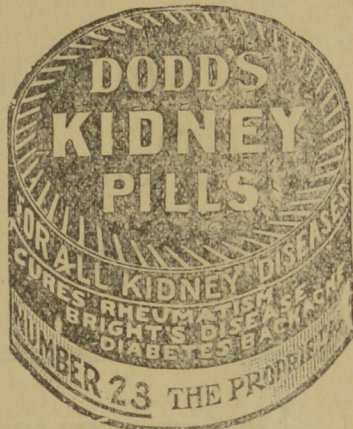

BECOMING ALARMED

St. John Telegraph

Convinced that St. John's position with respect to the traffic of the Grand Trunk Pacific is growing uncertain because of the failure of that railway to provide for a line into St. John, and because arrangements to handle freight here next year are under way, the Borden Club, the organization of younger Conservatives last evening decided that the time has come to put these matters up to the Federal government. In executive session last evening the Borden Club unanimously adopted the following progressive resolution:

Whereas, The Hon. Mr. Cochrane, Minister of Railways, has stated that the eastern division of the National Transcontinental will be operated via the Quebec ferry early in 1914; and

Whereas, Mr. Chamberlin, president of the G. T. P., has stated that the G. T. P. did not intend to do anything at present towards erecting terminal at St. John; and

Whereas Mr. Gutelius, manager of the I. C. R. stated that the N. T. R. have running rights over the I. C. R. from Moncton to St. John; and

Whereas the Minister of Railways has stated that terminals to handle freight and passengers will probably be completed as soon as the wharves are finished at Courtenay Bay—which will necessarily not be for some years; and

Whereas No provision has been made to erect and have ready terminals to receive passengers and freight by the time the eastern division of the N. T. R. is being operated; and

Whereas unless necessary steps are at once taken, St. John will not receive any of the early traffic from the N. T. R., which will go to either Halifax, N. S., or Portland, Me., or to both.

Therefore resolved, that the R. L. Borden Club request the Hon. Mr. Hazen, minister of marine and fisheries, and member for the city and county of St. John, to bring the above facts to the notice of the cabinet; and

Further resolved, That the Hon. Mr. Hazen be requested to urge upon the proper authorities the necessity that running rights for the N. T. R., from Moncton to St. John, be at once secured, and that it is imperative that immediate steps be taken to arrange for the erection of terminals at St. John; and

Further resolved, That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Hon. Mr. Hazen.

PROTESTS AGAINST
I. C. R. FREIGHT RATES

Amherst, N. S., June 17—At the annual meeting a few days ago of the Amherst Board of Trade the strong action of the Board in regard to the increase freight rates over the I.C.R. is thus reported by the Amherst News.

President Sutherland reported that he had taken upon himself, after considering with several members of the Board of Trade Council to wire E. N. Rhodes, M.P., a strong protest against the increased freight rates on the I.C.R. Mr. Sutherland thought that when the Government had just reported a surplus of one million dollars in the operating expenses of the Intercolonial that it was decidedly inopportune for the railway authorities to increase the local rates and wanted the Board of Trade to endorse his action in sending the wire to Mr. Rhodes asking him to protest against the increased rates in the name of the Amherst Board of Trade.

"It was moved by R. C. Fuller and seconded by W. A. Christie that this Board unanimously approve of the action taken by its President, C. S. Sutherland in protesting against increased freight rates lately put in force on the Intercolonial Railway. The matter was discussed by B. D. Bent, D. A. Morrison and a number of others. Mr. Morrison stated emphatically that for the last eight months the passenger service of the road had been very bad and if the I. C. R. authorities were going to make the people of the Maritime Provinces pay Company rates, they on their part should be prepared to give us at
