murdered man in the mill, and on the day of the killing, the attack on Sabatis was committed without aggravation on the part of the Indian. The witness told of being at work near both men that morning. He saw the prisoner pick up a stick and strike the Indian over the head with it. There was a pile of lumber at the spot and the prisoner told the Indian to get away quick. He (witness) said he heard Sabatis make no objection, and in fact did not even see him move his lips.

Continuing, he testified that after the blow had been struck the prisoner ran away and went to his (witness's) house and procured a loaded rifle, and then went to his own house. Witness followed him home and succeeded in getting the rifle from him. The prisoner asked him if the Indian got to his feet after he had struck him. When witness told him that the Indian was dead, the prisoner told him he (witness) could help him out as he (the prisoner) did not strike the Indian.

The testimony of the prisoner's father-in-law being concluded, the magistrate decided that the testimony was so clearly against the prisoner that it was unnecessary to call the other witnesses and these were accordingly subpoenaed to appear before the Supreme Court when the case comes up in October.

JUDGEMENTS GIVEN IN SUPREME COURT YESTERDAY

Judgment in eight cases were given in the Supreme Court yesterday afternoon Chief Justice Sir Frederic E. Barker presided. The judgments follow:

Brown et al vs. Bartlett—Appeal dismissed with costs, Barker C. J. giving judgment of the court and Barry J., from whose judgment the appeal was made, taking no part.

In re expropriation of lands of E. Byron Bull by the St. John & Quebec Railway Company—Appeal dismissed with costs, Barker C. J. delivering judgment; McKeown, the trial justice, and McLeod taking no part.

In re agreement for lands between John Reardon and St. John & Quebec Railways ex parte George Shea—McLeod J. gives judgment of court to set aside order of court of November, 1912, and all proceedings thereunder with costs, the railway company to have liberty to take out of court the money paid on application to registrar.

Miller et al vs. Rundle et al—Appeal drops the court having divided evenly, McKeown, the trial justice, and Barker C. J. taking no part. Justices McLeod and White were for allowing the appeal on payment of costs and Justices Landry and Barry for the dismissal of the appeal.

and upon her body. Miss McPherson called physicians, but they could only establish the fact that Dr. Knabe had died several hours before as a result of the wound in her throat.

The authorities were notified and the police made a careful investigation, without being able to find any clue that would throw the faintest light upon the mystery of the case. Notwithstanding the fact that no weapon could be found in the apartment and the even more baffling absence of blood upon the bed covers or in any part of the room where the body was found, the police in the end advanced the absurd theory that Dr. Knabe had committed suicide and abandoned further investigation.

After the police had given up the investigation, the Indianapolis Council of Women, composed of some of the most prominent women in Indiana, undertook to solve the mystery. They employed H. C. Webster, a private detective to hunt the murderer. It was upon the findings of his investigation that the grand jury based the indictment found on December 31, 1912, against Dr. William B. Craig as principal and Alonzo M. Bagsdale as accessory to the crime. It was shown to the grand jury that Dr. Craig and Dr. Knabe had been intimate friends for a long time and that Dr. Knabe insisted upon Craig marrying her. It was also shown that on the evening before her death Dr. Knabe had visited the Craig home. It was also pointed out that the person who committed the murder was a person thoroughly familiar with human anatomy. Dr. Craig has been at liberty under \$15,000 bail.

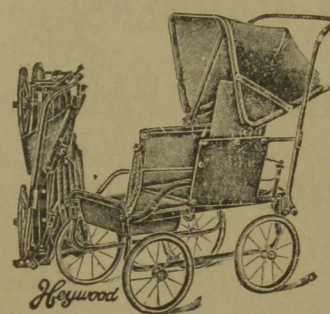
