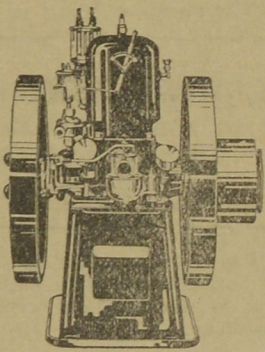

## Fredericton Drops to Third Place in League

St. Croix Won 11 to 10 Yesterday in Last Inning  
---St. John Beat Bangor---Bob Conley, Pitcher Edwards and First Baseman Wakefield Joined Pets at St. Stephen---St. John Leading League

Calais, June 20—In an exciting game far more interesting than the score would indicate, the Calais and St. Stephen team defeated the Fredericton nine by the score of 11 to 10 here this afternoon. Doyle's heavy swatters drove Ganley's star twirlers Flynn, Ahearn and Edwards, off the mound. Duggan was brought in from the field and they tied the game on Duggan and won the winning run in the ninth.

This was the lucky day for the Doyle's, the turning point occurring in the sixth when the visitors had the game nicely laid away by a score of 9 to 3. The locals had one of the most spectacular batting rallies seen here for some time in their round of the sixth, netting them four runs. The game became intensely interesting. This is how it happened.

Fredericton led the scoring, tallying two runs in the first, none in the second, one in the third, two in the fourth.

Calais and St. Stephen scored one in the first, none in the second, two in the third, none in the fifth. Neither side scored in the fifth. In the sixth inning B. Conley's fly bounced from Parker's glove, allowing him safe at first. Callahan's grounder was fumbled by McPherson and Tetrault, losing a chance for a fine double play, both runners being safe. Wakefield sacrificed, advancing Conley to third and Callahan to second. Murphy made a perfect bunt. Conley threw the ball to Gross but too late to tag B. Conley, who slid home safe. Callahan advanced to third, Murphy safe at first. Flynn knocked a home run, clearing the bases. Fryer grounded out. Ganley's grounder was too hot for McPherson and he was safe at first. Duggan singled to right advancing Ganley to second. Ganley went out, stealing third, four runs. Score: Pets 9, St. Croix 3.

The locals never say die until the last man is out and they got to Flynn in their round of the sixth. Parker got a life on a high throw of Fryer to Wakefield. Lynch fled out. McPherson singled to centre, moving Parker to second. Tetrault doubled to right, while Parker and McPherson tallied. Exit Flynn. Ahearn went in to stop the swat fest. Pease doubled to right, scoring Tetrault. Jacobson got a life on Ahearn's slow throw to Wakefield. Pease advanced to third. Jacobson stole second and collided with Fryer, who dropped the ball while Pease scored. Vance's grounder tried for by B. Conley was secured by Fryer but the ball was too late at first. Jacobson went to third. Jacobson and Vance tried a squeeze play for a score but it was nipped in the bud by Murphy to Callahan to Murphy, Jacobson out at the plate. Vance safe at second. Gross fanned four runs. The score now stood: Fredericton 9, St. Croix 7.

Each side scored a run in the seventh. Fredericton failed to tally in the eighth but the Doyle's came back with the wallop in their session. After driving Flynn and Ahearn off the mound they got Edwards' goat and tied the ribbon around its neck. Duggan, the left fielder, was brought in to stay the slaughter and after the smoke cleared away the locals had tied the game, 10 to 10. Pease walked, Jacobson knocked the ball over the fence for the home run, the prettiest hit of the season, making the tying run. Vance singled. Gross sacrificed, Vance out at second. Conley grounded out, retiring the side.

St. John, June 21—The Greeks won easily from Bangor yesterday afternoon on the local grounds, score 8 to 4.

Wallace, the new pitcher for Bangor, was hit hard and often and the Marathons' batting average was given a boost at his expense. Dederich was on the mound for the locals and he was touched for eleven safe ones, four being made in the ninth, but Dederich was not forced to exert him self in any inning except the last.

For the visitors, McLellan, Wildes and Lamorey put up a good exhibition of fielding, and Lamorey, Wildes and Mayo delivered the stickwork; while for the locals, Ramsey, O'Brien and Shankey were steady on defence and Black, Ram and O'Brien, Riley and Dederich produced the wallops. Bangor scored one in the first. A pass and two singles put Dederich in a hole and after retiring a batter on strikes the Marathon pitcher walked the next batter, forcing a run. Dederich then located the pan and relieved the pressure by striking out two men.

The visitors fell on Dederich in the ninth and four hits sent in two runs after two were down, and the Maine men sent in a pinch hitter to clean things up but Dederich tightened and the emergency batter missed three.

The Greeks made one in the third on a double by O'Brien and singles by Ramsey and Black. Three runs were piled up in the fourth on passes to O'Brien and Riley and singles by Dederich and Black and three more in the fifth on a pass to O'Brien and singles by Waterhouse; Dederich, Ramsey and Black. Shankey brought in the last tally when he hit a hot one to short in the eighth and was safe and scored on Riley's drive to centre.

## HARVARD BEAT YALE IN EIGHT OARED RACE

Crimson Made Clean Sweep of This Year's Sporting Events---Won by Eleven Lengths

New Haven, Conn., June 20—For the sixth consecutive year, Harvard's varsity eight oared crew triumphed over the Yale oarsmen in the long four mile race that closed the annual inter-university regatta here this afternoon. Preceded by the two crimson victories and the two wins of Thursday, it completed a Harvard sweep that has been equalled but once or twice in the long history of Yale-Harvard rowing. Tonight bands of Cambridge students are parading the streets shouldering new brooms, emblematic of the crimson sweep of the Thames River.

The final defeat administered to Yale was so crushing and complete that the English stroke and rowing methods imported from Oxford are being held up to ridicule this evening in a manner which many an oarsman thinks unjust at this time.

Sweeping down the river with a steady and consistent stroke, Harvard crossed the finish line eleven lengths ahead of the Blue, in 21 minutes and 42 seconds. The Eli eight rolled and splashed across in Harvard's wake, just thirty-eight seconds late, as badly defeated a crew as has been seen on the Thames river course in some years.

Except during the first mile the race was merely a procession, with the Crimson oarsmen increasing their lead steadily. It was not that the Yale sweep-swingers broke or failed to get speed out of their English stroke, but Harvard surpassed them in every department of the art of rowing.

Using a trifle quicker stroke, Coach Wray's pupils drove their long knife-like racing craft through the water at a faster pace and with less lost motion, yet, in the end, they failed to show the symptoms of excessive exhaustion that marked the finish of the blues. During the last half mile of the race Harvard maintained a fast pace, finishing with a racing sprint that carried the stroke up to 40 to the minute. As the shell slid across the finish the oarsmen dropped their sweeps and slapped each other on the back and then waved to friends who were chanting the long drawn out Harvard cheer.

### DEWAR CUP WON

BY UNITED STATES TEAMS

Washington, June 20—Beating Great Britain by forty-one points, United States has won the International shooting match just completed, and re-captured the Dewar Cup. The scores made public today were:—United States, 24,551; Great Britain, 24,510.

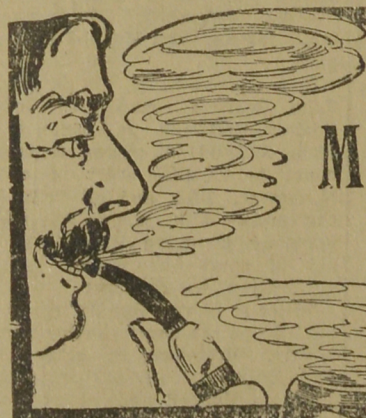
International rifle shooting matches in which the United States will compete during the present year.
