POLIGE SEIZED  
LIQUOR VALUED  
AT ABOUT \$200

Daniel Wall's Pool Room, King Street  
Raided Last Night—Two Wagon  
Loads of Liquor Found by  
Officials

Liquor of various kinds valued at about two hundred dollars was seized by the police last night at the pool-room in King street, West End, kept by Daniel Wall. The raid was made in the enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act. Those in authority say that warnings to close have had no effect on those keeping the pool-room and residents of the locality say that a supply of liquor was openly taken to the place a short time ago. Daniel Wall acknowledged a first offense against the Canada Temperance Act a few days ago and paid a fine of fifty dollars.

The raid attracted much attention and the liquor seized made two wagon-loads. It is stored at the police station. Among the lot is a fifty-eight gallon cask of ale, four casks of other liquors and a basketful. Information will be laid early next week against the proprietor of the place as a result of the raid.

POTATO MARKET  
EXPERIENCES ANOTHER  
SERIOUS SLUMP

Slippers Offering Only Sixty-Five Cents per Barrel Today—Slow Sale at Retail Prices of One Dollar

The potato-market has had another slump and the decline coming as it does shortly after an increase in price with a prospect of better conditions hits the farmers of this vicinity pretty hard. The recent improvement in prices is now said to have been due to temporary conditions, shippers paying increased prices to catch the United States market when it showed a slight improvement.

Heavy stocks of potatoes are now carried by farmers of the province and with the market as bad as it is there will be considerable loss.

Shippers are now offering sixty-five cents per barrel for potatoes. A few weeks ago the price was about double that. In the country market this morning potatoes were offered at a retail price of one dollar per

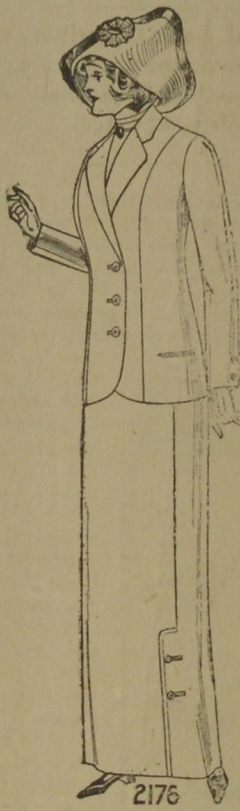

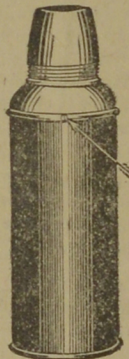
