Fredericton Again at Top of N. B.--Main League

Beat St. Croix 6 to 1 in Slow Game Yesterday--Visiting Team Was All to the Bad and Gave "Dutch" Howard rotten support--Ahearn Pitched Well and Was Backed up Strongly

Fredericton beat St. Croix 6 to 1 yesterday in a slow game which was as much unlike that of the day preceding as possible. The league leaders played as punk as they could. "Dutch" Howard was in the box for St. Croix and worked well but with his team-mates falling down repeatedly his pitching went for naught. "Lefty" Ahearn was on the mound for Fredericton and showed his old-time speed and skill. His support was almost perfect. Keaney failed connect with one which came along the ground at him and that was the sole error. It was through it that St. Croix tallied their one run. Fredericton hit Howard for four, two of them were three-baggers but it was the errors that let them score.

THE GAME.

A double play, Duggan catching, a fly and throwing a man out at first Callahan to Stone, nipped St. Croix's chances in the first and was one of the star plays of the game. In the second Tetrault drove a hard one at Keaney that went under him. Two sacrifices sent him to third and he scored on Spiller's hit. Pease got a two-base hit in the fourth but was thrown out at third by Keaney. A double play, Callahan to Keaney to Stone sewed things up in the fifth.

In the sixth St. Croix made three hits and filled the bases but did not score. Vance's drive to Conley being handled perfectly and retiring the side. In the ninth St. Croix looked dangerous but another double play retired the side.

For Fredericton Keaney got on in the first on an error and scored on Bob Ganley's three-bagger. Bob came home on Stone's sacrifice. In the third two errors let Ganley reach second. He took third on a choice and scored when Stone was put out at second. A base on balls, a stolen base, an error and a sacrifice let Ganley score in the fifth. In the sixth Callahan rapped out a three-bagger and scored on Howard's error. Duggan scored in the seventh reaching first on Gross' error, taking second on another by Howard, being sacrificed to third and scoring on Conley's hit.

The Pets did not go to St. Stephen today the rain preventing the game.

BAN JOHNSON DISPLEASED OVER JAKE STAHL'S CASE

Says McAleer Made a Mistake--Stahl Not to Blame for Poor Showing of Red Sox--McAleer Answers That Ban Does Not Know Circumstances

New York, July 16--Pres. B. B. Johnson of the American League, who left this city tonight for Detroit, appeared both surprised and vexed to learn that Jake Stahl had been relieved of the management of the World's Champion Red Sox by Pres. McAleer of the Boston club. Commenting on the release of Stahl, Johnson said:

"I deeply regret that Mr. McAleer acted so hastily. There was no reason for relieving Stahl of management of the Boston team at this time and he was entitled to every consideration the Boston club and the American League could give him."

"Stahl won the World's Championship for the American League last fall, yet in spite of that fact he was released by Mr. McAleer in midseason and right in his home city, Chicago."

"Stahl cannot be held accountable for the poor showing of the Red Sox this season. Gardner, Yerkes, Wagner, Lewis and Wood have all been out of the game on account of injuries, and Stahl himself was unable to play on account of an injury to his foot."

"I feel that the American League may be sharply criticised for Mr. McAleer's hasty and ill-advised action, and if I had been in Chicago yesterday Stahl would not have been let out in such a fashion."

"If it were absolutely necessary to put some one else in charge of the Red Sox it could have been done at the close of the season. As it is Stahl has been humiliated in his home city, and the American League has been placed in the unenviable position of dropping in midseason a manager who won the World's Championship last fall. Stahl was a honorable and competent manager and was highly esteemed in our league."

PRECIPITATED BY STAHL.

Detroit, July 16--Pres. McAleer of the Boston Red Sox was shown a dispatch from New York tonight giving a statement from Pres. Ban Johnson of the American League criticising McAleer's actions in letting out Jake Stahl. The Boston President read the despatch and said:

"When Pres. Johnson sees me and gets the story straight he will change his opinion. Jake Stahl came to me and, finding that the Boston club intended to make a change next season in the management practically insisted in quitting then and there, but wanted his salary in full."

"After that I realized that he and at his own request agreed to pay him for the full season and signed an agreement to that effect."

"I hoped that Stahl would finish the season and informed Pres. Johnson in Chicago that I would let Stahl out when his contract was up next fall. I did the proper thing for the Boston Club. I felt as badly as anyone, but I had a duty to perform and went through with it."

"I hope that Pres. Johnson stops off here on his way to Chicago, and he will learn that I never humiliated Jake Stahl or lost a real friend in the American League."

After a two weeks' rest Stahl will return to his desk in his Chicago bank. "He should worry."

BALK RULE TO BE ENFORCED STRICTLY

New York, July 17--President Lynch of the National League, today sent the following notice to all club managers:

"League umpires have been instructed to enforce rule 34, section 1, as follows:

"If, with one or more runners on the bases, the pitcher (either) by accident or intent drops the ball while in the act of delivering same to batsman, or in throwing to first where occupied by a base runner, the umpire will call a 'balk,' and the runner or runners will advance one base. Please inform your players of the above."

McGRAW SIGNS CUBAN

New York, July 17--Manager McGraw of the New York National League team announced today that he had signed Emilio Palmero, one of the star pitchers of the Almendares team of Havana.

Palmero is a big fellow, 6 feet tall with tremendous speed as one of his chief pitching assets. The new Cuban pitcher will report to the Giants next spring at the Marlin training camp.

CHANCE GETS NEW ONE

Dunkirk, N.Y., July 17--Frank Schmitt, a semi-professional pitcher, announced this afternoon that he had signed with Manager Frank Chance of the New York Americans. The Buffalo International League team and the Philadelphia Americans were after Schmitt. In addition to being a steing pitcher he is a heavy batter and fast on the bases.
