## AUTO AND PARTY FELL OVER BANK OF NASHWAAK RIVER

W. F. McManus and Party in Serious Accident Near Stanley Yesterday---Had Wonderful Escape From Death Painful Injuries

Mr. W. F. McManus, Miss Lillian McManus, their mother and Miss Ward, their guest, had a miraculous escape from death yesterday afternoon when the motor-car in which they were driving went over the bank of the Nashwaak River three miles from Stanley, overturned throwing its occupants out and lodged against two birch trees. All members of the party were much shaken up and today are under the doctor's care. Mrs. McManus had her face severely cut and her teeth broken. Miss Ward when thrown from the car struck upon her head and was painfully injured. The other members of the party were bruised and scratched. The car was much damaged.

The accident occurred on a steep hill near the covered bridge three miles south of Stanley. W. L. Anderson and family, who were in their own car but accompanying the McManus party took the hill all right. The McManus car became stalled when about half way up. Miss McManus who was driving put on the emergency brake, a new one, but for some unknown reason it failed to act. The car backed and went off the road which at that point runs along the steep bank of the Nashwaak River, throwing out its occupants and lodged against the two birch trees (Continued from page eight)

## BUILDING STRIKE SETTLED ON BASIS OF \$2 PER DAY

Hod-Carriers Union and Contractors Conferred Re Matters Thursday Afternoon---By Vote Union Accepted Terms Offered

The building strike which been on all week has been settled. Some of the striking hod-carriers went back to work this morning. On some of the contracts the work is not in a condition at present for continuation and on others work has been held up by rain. All the strikers are expected to be at work Monday. The basis of settlement is a minimum wage of \$2 per day.

Yesterday afternoon Ald. Mose Mitchell and J. Fred Ryan the contractors most affected by the strike were present on invitation at a meeting of the Hod Carriers' Union. Both expressed their views on the matter of wages and told the strikers their reasons for not paying the minimum wage of \$2.25 per day as had been demanded. They offered a minimum wage of \$2 per day and the men decided to accept it.
