



SCHOOL BOOK POLICY CRITICIZED IN HOUSE

Bill to Increase the Salaries of Premier Flemming and Hon. Dr. Landry Agreed to—Hon. Mr. Grimmer Says the Government Wants to be Up-to-date

The House met on Tuesday at three o'clock.

Hon. Mr. Murray presented the report of the Standing Rules Committee.

Mr. Munro presented the report of the Municipalities Committee.

Mr. Slipp presented the report of the Corporations Committee.

Mr. Jones introduced a bill to incorporate the St. John Suburban Railway.

Hon. Dr. Landry submitted the annual Report on Agriculture for 1912.

NO NOTICE GIVEN

Hon. Mr. McLeod moved for the suspension of rules to permit of introduction of a bill to authorize the appointment of a stipendiary magistrate and the erection of a lock up in the parish of McAdam, York County. He explained that through a misapprehension no public notice had been given of this bill. He read the resolution, unanimously passed by the York County Council in favor of the establishment of the lock up, and asked that Hon. members grant leave to introduce the bill, which was in the public interest, without publication.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer introduced a bill to fix the valuation for assessment on the Canadian Sardine Co., Ltd.

The House went into Committee with Mr. Dickson (Albert) the chair and agreed to the bill to confirm certain grants to the Commissioners of the National Transcontinental Railway.

THE SALARY GRAB

The bill respecting the Executive Council was then considered.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer said that the Government were endeavoring to adopt more modern lines with respect to the offices held by members of the cabinet. The New Brunswick was the only province of Canada he knew of which had adhered to the veyor General, and this bill provided titles of Commissioners and Stated that the members of the cabinet would in future be known as Ministers. The term Surveyor General was an obsolete term and had no significance to the public in any part of Canada outside of New Brunswick and very little in this province. The term signified a man who was in charge of a band of land surveyors. In view of that fact and also the fact that that members holding portfolios in the other provinces of Canada were termed Ministers, it was proposed to change the titles of the members of the provincial cabinet to Ministers which New Brunswick was going ahead and desired to adopt modern methods. The bill further provided for a salary of \$2100 to be attached to the office of Premier.

Neither the Government or the people of New Brunswick could expect the Premier to spend practically his entire time in the interest of the province for the paltry compensation that had been paid him in the past, therefore, provision was made

in this bill for the payment of \$2400 annually to the Premier as an emolument in connection with the duties of his office as Premier. Under the provisions of this bill the salary of the Commissioner of Agriculture was placed on the same basis with that paid the other members of the Government. The Government moreover was convinced that the salaries paid the members of the cabinet was inadequate, and he felt that it was a matter of regret that the members were not able to devote their whole time to public affairs, as that would be the proper course to pursue if conditions were suitable. When regulations were made to enable the members of the Government to devote their whole time to public affairs, he felt that it would serve to assist very much more towards the advancement that the province was making. He did not think there would be a discordant voice among Hon. members to the increase to the Commissioner for Agriculture, particularly in view of the greater responsibilities of the Commissioner and the Department.

Another provision in the bill made it possible for the members of the Executive Council not occupying portfolios should be paid \$12 per day for actual attendance at meetings of the Government.

The bill further provided for the abolition of the office of Solicitor General, which meant that the Government save the salary and travelling expenses of that official. In addition to that the Government had carried on the Administration of Justice at a cost less than that of many previous years.

Mr. Stewart (Northumberland) suggested changes in the phraseology of the third section of the bill.

The bill was agreed to with amendments.

AGRICULTURAL SCHOOLS

The Committee then took up the consideration of the bill to establish agricultural schools in New Brunswick.

Hon. Dr. Landry said that he believed that Hon. members would admit that the bill was one of the most important that would be introduced in this House. The province had long felt the need of agricultural education, but there had not been sufficient funds at the disposal of the government to grapple with this question before this year when the Federal grant made it possible to take concerted action along these lines. The Government felt that was only right and proper that they should provide educational facilities for the agricultural classes along the lines followed in other provinces. The Department proposed to ahead as rapidly as possible in the establishing of the schools at Sussex and Woodstock, and he trusted the work which would be carried on in these schools would be a source of great benefit to our farmers.

Hon. Mr. Flemming said that the intimation had been given in the Speech from the Throne that it was proposed to establish two agricultural schools. He wanted to endorse what had been said by the commissioner for agriculture and also to point out that the school at Woodstock had been established under exceedingly favorable conditions. Hon. members had rarely had placed before them a measure fraught with greater possibilities for the people of the province than this bill providing for the education of the agricultural classes. The late Mr. L. P. Fisher of Woodstock, a man very industrious in his daily life, had enjoyed a large and lucrative practice. Mr. Fisher was also a very thoughtful man and he thought out well in regard to the distribution of his estate, leaving practically all he possessed to go towards the benefit of the town he lived in.

Hon. Mr. Murray suggested that as it was the intention to give instructions in manual training, that fact should be included in the section mentioning the subjects to be taught.

Section one was amended to provide for this addition.

Mr. Stewart, Northumberland, moved to amend section two by striking out the word "each" which he said was totally unnecessary.

The amendment was agreed to.

The bill was agreed to with amendments.

The House went into committee on supply with Mr. Dickson, Albert, in the chair.

On the item of \$2,000 for a dairy school, Hon. Dr. Landry said that it was placed in the estimates for re-


