SCHOOL BOOK POLICY  
CRITICIZED IN HOUSE

pairs to the school at Sussex in the event of the new agricultural school not being established there.

OUR AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY  
PRAISED.

Mr. Young commended the work on behalf of the farmers of the province that the present government during the past five years had accomplished and said that conditions during that period had been much improved over the past. The grants now available from the federal government would make it possible to do even more particularly along the line of agricultural education. He referred to the success which had attended the history of Agricultural Society No. 34 of York County, which had started without any capital and now had gross assets to the extent of more than \$34,000. This society has given highly successful exhibitions and unlike some others, had not found it necessary to ask the government to pay the fire insurance premiums on its buildings. The Society was very grateful for the assistance it had received from the government. It had in the past paid out more in premiums from its prize list than the amount of the government grants, but so much success had attended the exhibitions that it had held that there had been a fine property acquired by the Society and it was now almost free from debt. He hoped that the show, which the Society proposed holding this fall would be as successful as those in the past.

## A KICK OVER SCHOOL BOOKS.

On the item of \$17,500 for school books and expenses, Mr. Black said there was getting to be too much of the province's money tied up in school books held in stock by the various vendors throughout the province. He believed there were too many vendors and knew that was the case in Westmorland County. In order to get the school book business on a proper basis it would be necessary to place the books with the vendors on a cash basis only, and believed this would be the best idea even if it became necessary to increase the percentage of profit for the vendors up to 20 per cent. or more instead of 10 per cent. as at present. There were bound to be bad debts under the present system.

Hon. Mr. McLeod said that the school book business in order to be on the best basis should be a cash proposition between the department and the vendors but he did not favor reducing the number of vendors and thus making it more convenient than at present for the pupils and their parents to procure the books.

Mr. Young favored doing away with vendors altogether and having the Government dispose of the books to the trade on cash terms, allowing a sufficient margin to make it profitable for the merchants to handle books.

Mr. Woods said that he favored the introduction of an entirely new system. The teachers were anxious to receive more remuneration, which was very commendable, and he thought an arrangement could be worked out whereby the teachers could handle the books themselves.

Mr. Black asked if anything was being done by the Government to provide more assistance for schools in the back settlements. In Westmorland County there was a number of districts where it seemed impossible under existing conditions to have the schools opened for two terms in each year and in some cases the rate for school assessment was up to \$4 on the \$100 which Hon. members could realize was practically a prohibited figure. He suggested that something might be done to have a minimum salary limit of \$600 per annum and a maximum tax rate of \$1.50 on \$100 and have the Government make up the difference between the amount of the assessment on that basis and the expenses of the school district.

On the item of \$500 for Executive Council Contingencies:

Mr. McLeod said that there was a printer's error in the estimates as submitted to the House, and that for the President of the Council and member without portfolio \$400 should have been placed as the allowance for each.

On the item of \$1200 expenses of Moving Picture Censures:

Mr. Stewart (Northumberland) asked for information.

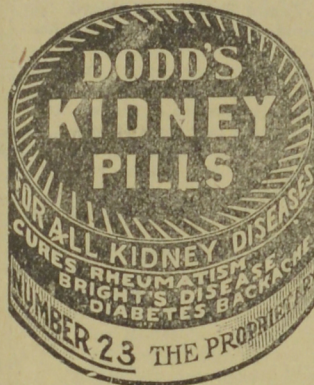
Hon. Mr. Grimmer said that the Board of Censures inspected every film which came to the film exchanges at St. John and from there were sent to the moving picture theatres throughout the province. As many as thirty-six films a day were passed upon and the members of the board spent thirty hours a week, and in some cases even more in carrying out their duties. The chairman of the Board was paid \$400 per year and the two others were paid \$300 each. The film exchanges paid license fees and so did the theatres and the operators of the machines, with the result that moving pictures were a revenue producer for the province.

Mr. Tilley asked about vaudeville performances in connection with the

moving pictures. He said that he had seen vaudeville put on in a certain theatre in a certain city of the province which was not fit to be seen by any woman, and he would like to know if the Board of Censures had any control over that.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer said that the Board had no control over vaudeville. Licenses were granted for the operation of moving pictures, and the vaudeville was under the control of the police authorities. When the question of moving picture theatres and their licenses was before the government, a minister and an owner of moving picture theatres of St. John had appeared before a committee of the executive of which he was a member, and they had told the committee that moving pictures were for the uplifting of humanity and were of a great benefit to the youth of the country, and the minister had said that he spent five nights a week at the picture theatres as the
