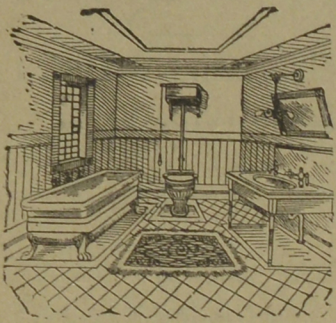

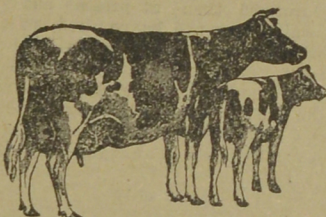

MEETING OF LOCAL HOUSE ON FRIDAY WAS BRIEF

The House met on Friday at three o'clock.

Hon. Mr. Murray presented the report of the Standing Rules Committee.

Mr. Munro presented the report of the Municipalities Committee.

Mr. Black moved for the suspension of rules to permit of the introduction of a bill to consolidate and amend the acts relating to the University of Mount Allison College, and to change the name of the corporation to the Regents of Mount Allison.

Mr. Munro introduced a bill to amend the act relating to the Village of Bath.

Dr. Bourque presented a petition in favor of a bill to further amend the act to authorize the Municipality of Kent to affect temporary loans.

Mr. Dickson, Kings, introduced a bill to enable the St. John Railway Company to extend its railway lines into Kings County.

Mr. Carson introduced a bill to amend the act incorporating the New Brunswick Hydro-Electric Company.

Mr. Black introduced a bill to consolidate and amend the acts relating to the University of Mount Allison College and to change the name of the corporation to the Regents of Mount Allison.

Dr. Price introduced a bill relating to the purchase of the Moncton Exhibition Association property.

Hon. Mr. Flemming presented the petition of the New Brunswick Shales Ltd., in favor of a bill respecting the New Brunswick Shales Ltd.

Hon. Mr. Flemming introduced a bill to authorize a grant to the Cartier Monument Fund.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer moved for the suspension of rules to permit of the introduction of a bill to amend and consolidate the act incorporating and relating to the Town of St. Stephen.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer presented the report of the Law Committee.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer presented a petition in favor of a bill to amend the act incorporating and relating to the Town of St. Stephen.

The House went into committee with Mr. Young in the chair and agreed to the bills to amend the Public Health Act, 1911, and in fur-

ther aid of the University of New Brunswick.

The committee then considered the bill to provide for a Fair Wage Schedule.

Hon. Mr. McLeod said that the bill was introduced to meet the request of the various labor unions of the province for a fair wage schedule on public works, which the government readily acquiesced in. Provision was made that a fair wage schedule shall in future be a part of every contract of the Public Works Department. The schedule shall contain the wages that are fair, usual and customary at the time of the letting of the contract and in the locality in which the contract is to be performed.

The bill was agreed to.

The bill to amend the Succession Duties Act was then considered.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer moved to amend section two of the bill to provide that if succession duties were not paid within six months after the death of the deceased the rate of interest shall be five per cent.

The bill was agreed to as amended.

The House went into committee with Mr. Stewart, Northumberland, in the chair and resumed the consideration of the bill to amend the Parish of Lancaster Sewerage Act.

Mr. Baxter moved to amend the bill to provide that the City of St. John should only be liable when damages resulted by reason of trouble arising in the City of St. John, while the Parish of Lancaster should only be liable for damage caused from trouble originating within that parish. He said that the amendment had been agreed to between his hon. friend Mr. Tilley and himself.

Mr. Tilley said that the amendment was perfectly satisfactory to him as his desire had been to protect the people so that if damage were done they would be in a position to seek redress in the courts.

The bill was agreed to as amended.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer moved that when the House adjourn it stand adjourned until Monday, March 10th, at three o'clock p.m.

The House adjourned at 4.50 o'clock.

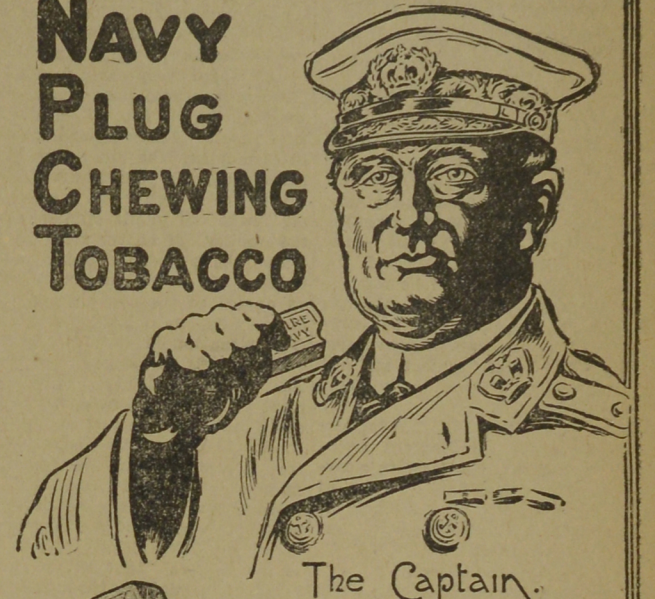

EXTINCT MONSTERS FOUND IN ALBERTA

The Director of the Dominion Geological Survey reports that great success attended the expedition sent out last summer to secure skeletons of the great extinct monsters that once inhabited the Canadian Northwest and whose remains are now found in vast quantities in bone beds of the Red Deer River, Alberta.

This well equipped expedition has returned with tons of fossil remains, principally those of (in saur, huge reptiles that flourished four or five million years ago toward the close of what the geologists call the Cretaceous period. Included in the collection are: two skeletons of the large plant-eating Trachodon as Duck billed dinosaur, one 32 feet long, and the other 40 feet long; remains of the ponderous plant-eating horned dinosaurs; and of flesh-eating dinosaur, now being called Albertosaurus. Credit for this fine collection belongs to Mr. Charles Sternberg, who was in charge of the season's operations. Mr. Sternberg was collector for the late Prof. Cope and has the reputation of being perhaps the best and most successful fossil-hunter. Disengaging the bones from the rock, preserving, preparing, and mounting them is a delicate operation requiring great skill and patience. The big dinosaurs are now being prepared for exhibition, in the palaeontological workshop at the Museum. The 32 foot reptile is being made into a panel mount which will show the position in which the creature was buried. The big 40-foot specimen will be erected as an open mount, which will display to advantage his huge dimensions and give a clear idea of his imposing presence when he was a

reigning monarch of the wilderness. The material collected last summer together with many specimens collected on earlier expeditions will pass through the hands of the skilled preparators, to increase the size and attractiveness of the palaeontological collection recently opened to the public in the Victoria Memorial Museum.

It may be noted that this now famous fossil locality of Alberta was discovered by the Canadian Geological Survey in 1884, when J. B. Tyrrell, exploring on the plains, uncovered the head of the Albertosaurus, which has been on exhibition in the Survey for the past quarter of a century. In 1889, T. Weston, a former collector of the Survey, was sent out to secure more material. In 1892 the Survey published a monograph by Prof. Cope on the material collected. In 1897, 1898, and 1901, L. M. Lamb, Vertebrate Palaeontologist of the Survey, was at work in this field bringing to light many new forms of the past life of our western country, including fishes, reptiles, turtles, dinosaurs, and small primitive mammals which have been figured and described in memoirs and papers of the Survey published in 1902, 1906, and at intervals since.

The expedition of the past season, however, was stronger and better equipped than any heretofore sent out by the Survey and the gratifying success which it has achieved will it is hoped, be followed up by further vigorous collecting during the coming summer.
