name of God, never. Time is too short, eternity too short to sever ties rooted in the love and fellowship of the gospel, for these are plants not rooted in mere human soil. But one will come and take my place and you will give him the love and loyalty you now give to me. No, no, through the gospel of the grace of God our hearts are so enlarged that he will come to take his own place and not the place you have given to me. He will be my successor, but he will not take my place. I pray that you will love him as you have loved me and that he will be more worthy of your love. But all the while I shall have my own place and shall rejoice.

### WILL NOT FORGET.

"And I shall go hence and take another people to my heart. I trust I may, and that they may be as worthy of my affection as you have proved to be. But I shall not forget you. The place you have, by the grace of God, you shall hold till memory fades and I forget my own. I shall always be a debtor to your loving kindness and for the confidence which you placed in me when, a stranger, I came to you. I shall thank my God for every remembrance of you and cherish that memory, among my most sacred possessions.

### PRESENCE OF GOD

"It is to the presence of God we are to look for the solution of our problems and perplexities. There are problems which mutually confront us. A little while ago I was faced with the problem of how I should invest the next period of my life to the best advantage. As I have already intimated I found from a physical standpoint a change was becoming a necessity. But there was another consideration which weighed with me. We all have our limitations and it is part of life's success to know them. There are certain things which one man can accomplish and certain other things he cannot do. There are certain lives in a church and congregation whom a pastor can reach and to whom he can be a blessing and there are others to whom his evangel and ministry do not appeal. There are certain periods through which a pastor can lead a people and when that work is accomplished some other man possessed of different gifts and endowed with different talents and temperament can take up the work and carry it to completion. I must frankly state that I came to realize that my limitations were no exception to the rule and this was one of the factors which decided my course of action. Since I have made up my mind about leaving I have had innumerable pulls at the heart-strings, but I have never doubted for one moment that I was taking the right course; and I am led to believe that God is with me in the going as he was with me in the coming.

### YOUR PART OF PROBLEM

"So he will be with you. You have your part of the problem to solve. He will help you to recognize the man he has chosen, to receive him as the ambassador of Christ and to work under his leadership. He will lead you into larger and more successful service for the best days of this church are yet to be. God removes his workmen, but carries on his work.

"There is not much I need say of myself for it is not my purpose to make a review of my labors. Speaking after the manner of men, mine might be considered a successful pastorate. But in the light of the ideals I have set for myself, I cannot help feeling I have dallied with the sacred fire. My heart would be sad indeed if it were not for the fact that the kingdom of God comes not with observation and that I have heard my Lord say to me when I beheld unfinished the temple which I would have built for him: 'Thou hast done well that it was in thine heart,' as he said to one of old.

### THE PEOPLE OF FREDERICTON

"I do not think I ought to close my message tonight without speaking a word of gratitude to the people of Fredericton outside this church from whom I have received so much consideration and of whom I have grown so fond. I have not put myself out to seek their good will. I have never hesitated to express my convictions when moral or social issues were at stake I have not hesitated to take the unpopular side when I regarded that the side of right. Yet from all classes and creeds I have received manifold tokens of good will which I appreciate more than words can express. Indeed there are many outside our own communion with whom I have labored side by side in so many activities to whom I feel as to my very own. I have delighted and do delight in the fellowship of the ministers of the city. For several years I have had the place of seniority among the local clergymen and I shall hold their good will in tender and grateful remembrance.

"The city itself with its many charms,—its avenues of graceful trees, its quiet restfulness, its beautiful river, its marks of culture and its happy homes has long appealed to me. You do not wonder that I

## BIRTHDAY CONGRATULATION

### CLIFFORD SIFTON

Hon. Clifford Sifton, who has long been a prominent figure in Canadian public life, was born in the County of Middlesex, Ontario, March 10, 1861. He graduated from Victoria University, Coburg, Ont., in 1880, and two years later was admitted to the Manitoba bar. From 1882 he remained in practice at Brandon. His active political career commenced with his election to the Manitoba Assembly in 1888. In 1891 he was called into the Manitoba cabinet as attorney general, in which office he established a high reputation for knowledge of the law and executive ability. After the general election of 1896, he accepted an appointment from Sir Wilfrid Laurier as minister of the interior in the Dominion cabinet. In 1903 he acted as British agent before the Alaska boundary arbitration tribunal. Later Mr. Sifton became chairman of the commission on the Conservation of the Natural Resources of Canada.

## FREE FOODERS ARE DELIGHTED

London, Feb. 17.—The 'Free Fooders' of Great Britain are delighted at the resolution of the Saskatchewan Farmers' Association condemning the food tax proposals.

This resolution exactly fulfils the prophecy of Mr. Asquith, who, when speaking of Leven on January 30, read a remarkable letter from the Manitoba Grain Growers' Association declaring that preference to Canadian wheat would mean increased cost to British consumers, and adding that the Manitoba farmers would not long stand alone in its proposals.

His assertion was ridiculed at the time, and attempts were made to belittle the Grain Growers' Association. Events have proved that Mr. Asquith was right.

This latest candid opinion from the farmers of Canada will prove a powerful weapon in the hands of free traders against the proposals of the Protectionists in regard to the food duties—proposals which may be revised and put forward in another form, whenever opportunity offers.
