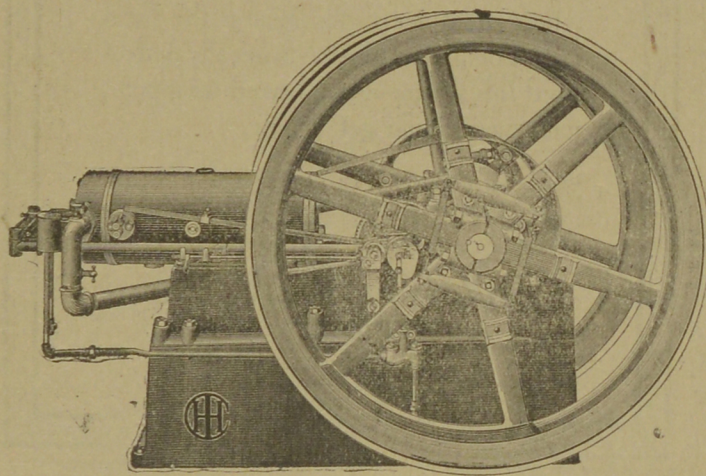

FOOTBALL COACH

AT DARTMOUTH

Will Handle Freshman Squad in Fall---
Playing College Baseball During
the Present Spring

(Boston Globe, Saturday)

From a reliable source it was learned last night that Frank W. Cavanaugh of Worcester will again be head of the Dartmouth College Football team next fall, in spite of the fact that rumors to the contrary have been current.

It has been whispered among Dartmouth graduates living in Greater Boston that Cavanaugh would resign or be displaced next fall, but the football committee has reappointed him.

There was talk that Lawrence H. Bankart of West Newton, who was assistant to Cavanaugh the last two seasons, would be engaged as head coach but as Bankart has signed a contract to coach the Colgate University team this year, his appointment is now out of the question.

The Dartmouth football committee has chosen three assistants to Mr. Cavanaugh. They are Walter B. Elcock of Dorchester, Wesley T. Engelhorn of Spokane, Wash., and David Morey of Malden.

Dave Morfy who played halfback last fall, is an old Malden High School athlete, and he will not sign a contract until the baseball season closes, having been elected captain for this spring. Ever since he entered Dartmouth his work in the backfield has been of high order. He will coach the freshman eleven and Coach Cavanaugh and the football committee are confident that he will develop a formidable team.

TO SQUELCH PLAYERS

WHO WRITE ARTICLES

Expert Criticism Does Not Appeal to
President of American League---
Injury to Baseball

Chicago, March 6—President B. E. Johnson, of the American League, is said to have a bank ready for hurling into the ranks of the player-scribes in his organization. It was learned last night that the league's executive was about to issue an edict which would either stop ball players from writing expert opinions for newspapers or stop their salaries.

"It is not the intention to infringe upon the rights of players," said Johnson, "but altered expert criticism and ball playing do not mix. I would not mind so much if the players themselves wrote the stuff which appears in the newspapers through the land, but in the great majority of cases, the player never sees the stories to which their names are appended until after they have been printed."

"These writings frequently have been an injury to the league and if it can be done, and I think it can, no American League player will be allowed to write these criticisms in the near future."
