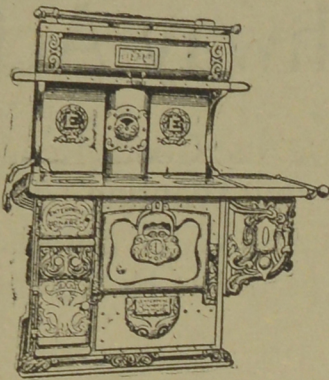

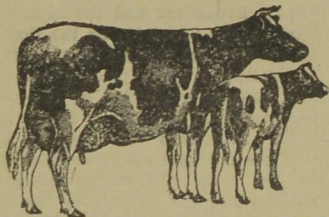

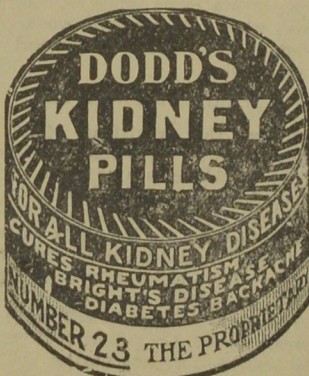

NEWS OF FREDERICTON TWENTY-ONE YEARS AGO

(From the files of the Weekly Herald Saturday, March 12, 1892.)

A FIRM BELIEF—Ald. Gilman has a firm belief in the prosperity of the city and is repairing his house in York Street.

PHONOGRAPH—Many citizens have become acquainted with the phonograph during the past week. Mr. Allerton has a very good one on exhibition at the Barker.

SEASON ENDED—The Celestial Curlers have laid away the stones for the season and will not again play unless a cold snap may induce them to accept the Marysville Club's invitation to accept a game at the Marysville Rink.

PROHIBITION COMMISSION—Rev Dr. McLeod of this city has been appointed on the Prohibition Commission. The other members are Sir Joseph Hickson of Montreal, George A. Gigault of Quebec, Edward F. Clark of Toronto and P. A. Monaghan of Ottawa, Secretary. (After an exhaustive inquiry extending over a period of several years the commission reported that the country was not ripe for prohibition.)

SHORT SEASON—The ice is going very fast and it is but a question of a few days when traffic on it will be ended. Two months ago Wednesday wheels gave place to runners and wheels have again appeared on the streets. This is the shortest period of sleighing on record in this city.

FIREMEN'S OUTING—Three teams with the firemen of the city accompanied by some twenty-five sleighs headed by the Infantry School Corps Band drove through the principal streets Thursday night. Roman candles helped to mark out the line of march.

MARITIME BANK CASE—Attorney General Blair intends going to London April 27 to argue the case of the local government versus the Maritime Bank before the Privy Council. He will be accompanied by Mrs Blair, Hon. A. F. Randolph, Mrs and the Misses Randolph. Mr. Randolph and family expect to do Europe before they return.

DIED AT SAN FRANCISCO—A despatch from San Francisco to the Chatham World says that Alex. J. Loggie who went to Los Angeles for his health last fall died on Friday at his brother's home in San Francisco. He was an honest straightforward business man. Deceased was a brother of Major T. G. Loggie of the Crown Land Department.

ABOUT A HORSE—A law suit which engaged quite an amount of attention was before Col. Marsh Thursday afternoon. Henry Wheary, plaintiff and George Wash of St. Mary's Indian Reserve, defendant, George Wilson and J. W. McCready were the respective counsel. The suit was in connection with a horse which died a few days ago. Mr. Wheary invoked the aid of the law to recover the value of the animal which was sixty dollars. Col Marsh reserved judgment.

APPOINTMENTS—Wm. Pringle, well known in York County where he was born has been appointed to a position in the St. John Business College. Arthur G. Harrison son of Dr. Harrison has left the city to take a position on the Chicago & St. Louis Railway.

WEDDING BELLS—On Thursday evening "The Gables" the residence of Attorney General Blair was the scene of a very pretty society event in the marriage of Mr. R. F. Randolph second son of Hon. A. F. Randolph to Miss Nellie Blair second daughter of Hon. A. G. Blair. Rev. R. W. Weddall resident pastor of the Methodist Church officiated. The ceremony took place at 7.30 o'clock Miss Marion E. Blair sister of the bride was bridesmaid and the sister was supported by A. G. Blair, Jr. There were many guests present including relatives of the contracting parties and members of the legislature. Miss Blair was presented on the eve of her marriage with a handsome solid silver tea service of eight pieces and talver by the members of the government and their supporters in the legislature. The silver bore the following inscription: "Presented to Miss Blair by the Government Supporters of the New Brunswick Legislature, March 10, 1892." A special train was awaiting at the station and at half past nine the happy couple accompanied by a number of friends boarded it and were soon whirled away to the Junction where they took the night express for the United States where they will make a six week's visit.

LUMBER COMMISSION—The report of the Lumber Commission was submitted to the legislature on Tuesday. After a recital of the terms of appointment and instructions the report method followed in obtaining

information by correspondence through a series of questions addressed to persons engaged in the lumbering industry. The commissioners recommended as follows:—

We therefore recommend that at the expiration of the term the lumber lands of the province be leased at public auction to be held by the lessees thereof by yearly license renewable from year to year during the pleasure of the government under conditions of compliance with all regulations made or to be made by the Lieutenant Governor-in-council. The report is signed by the three commissioners, Hon. A. F. Randolph, Frank Todd and Hon. Allan Ritchie.

JUDGE WETMORE'S DEATH—The death of Hon. Judge Wetmore robs the bench of one of the most brilliant ornaments, one whose judgments were sound clear and were accepted without comment. As a man and as a citizen he was held in great respect by all. Born in New Brunswick he has added a bright leaf to her laurels and has gone to the grave sorrowed not only by his native province but by the sister provinces as well. (The above refers to the late Hon. A. R. Wetmore, the father of A. R. Wetmore, C.E., and Mrs. T. C. Allen of this city. He was at one time premier and attorney general of New Brunswick.)

OBSERVANCE OF "SALMON DAY"

Portland, Ore., March 14—Colorado may have its melon day and California its raisin day, but it remained for this section of the country to add "salmon day" to the list of commercial holidays. By agreement of the salmon canners of the Northwestern States and British Columbia today has been set aside for the first annual observance of salmon day. Hotels, restaurants and dining cars throughout a large section of the country agreed to give salmon a particularly conspicuous place on the menus for the day, for the purpose of calling public attention to one of the greatest products of the Pacific Northwest of which a total of more than 3,500,000 cases, or about 165,000,000 pounds are canned and shipped each year.
