right of way without compensation in order that they might secure the great advantages of railway communication and facilities;

Therefore Resolved, that in the opinion of this House very important interests are served by the maintenance and operation of the said section of the Intercolonial Railway, and it is expedient in the public interest that this portion of the railway should be maintained and operated as heretofore, thereby serving the interests of a large number of persons living along and contiguous to the railway and dependent upon it for transportation and access to markets.

And Further Resolved that representation be made to the Hon. Minister of Railways and Canals of the Dominion of Canada requesting his favorable consideration of the claims of the persons dwelling along the line of the said railway to continuation of the services which they have enjoyed for a period of more than twenty-five years.

Mr. Stewart (Northumberland) said that his hon. friend the Premier had referred to the fact that the people had given to the contracting company a free right of way, and he (Stewart) felt sure that it would appeal to all hon. members that the people had not given the right away for the mere purpose of seeing the

railway built, but they had given it with the expressed and implied contract that the railway should be operated for all time, so that they would enjoy the necessary facilities. The Dominion Government, when they purchased the railway from the original owners certainly assumed all the obligations that the original owners had borne.

The people of the Chatham-Junction-Blackville section have the right of way knowing that it would be a benefit to them, while they had also endured the loss of a great deal of property during the construction and operation of the railway in patience, because they wanted the reward of railway communication. The people who had enjoyed these railway facilities for over a quarter of a century did not want to go back to the old condition of driving for miles and miles in puns, but naturally desired the advantage of the railway to convey their produce to market, rather than to carry it by horses and ox teams.

The railway was needed in this section because there was no bridge along the principal part of the river connecting the people on one side with the people on the other, and on that account if the section was abandoned as proposed it would mean that the people would be practically isolated and that they could not reach the markets without driving

Mr. Pugsley suggested that the minister of labor should state that the expression he used did not apply to a member of parliament.

CROTHERS SQUIRMS
"If the hon. gentleman thinks the remark does not apply to any one but himself I will withdraw," said Mr. Crothers.

"That is not a withdrawal," retorted Mr. Pugsley.

Mr. Crothers remarked that the member for St. John had overlooked the fact that his remark in the house was made only in a general way.

Mr. Boyce, of Algoma, and Meighen, of Manitoba, pressed for a withdrawal, so Dr. Pugsley said: "Since the minister of labor says he was not intoxicated, I will say that my description only applies to his language. Beyond that I do not care to withdraw."

Chairman Armstrong ruled that the explanation made by Dr. Pugsley was satisfactory and ordered Mr. MacKenzie to proceed with his speech. Mr. Meighen, however, insisted on holding the floor and announced his intention of appealing from the ruling of the chair. Then there was more confusion. Mr. Boyce got the floor and accused the Liberals of turning parliament into a bear garden.

"You are the bear," shouted one of the opposition members.

For the next few minutes the argument was confined largely to Chairman Armstrong and Mr. Meighen, who amidst a great uproar differed as to whether the withdrawal of the ex-minister of public works had been complete.

When Dr. Pugsley rose again he was greeted with Liberal cheers. Then Premier Borden walked into the Chamber and was greeted with a salvo of applause from the ministerial benches. Mr. Pugsley said he was

glad to see the prime minister because it would insure a proper observance of the rules of the House.

After some more discussion Mr. Armstrong expressed the view that it would probably be better for Dr. Pugsley to definitely withdraw the words he had used. The ex-minister said he would do so, but added:

"I would say, however, that if the language used by the minister of labor was used anywhere else but in this parliament I would describe it as dastardly and ungentlemanly."

TORIES THREATEN TO GAG.

Gagging was inaugurated by the government tonight. Hon. Robert Rogers took charge of the operations Premier Borden dropped into second place and humbly followed the new leader of the House.

The plan has been in preparation for several days. It is significant that the two most important performers are from Manitoba. They are Hon. Robert Rogers and J. A. M. Aiken, the Conservative member for Brandon.

THE SULLIVAN GUN LAW HELPS LAWLESS ELEMENT

New York, March 15—An effort has been made in the state legislature to have the "Sullivan Gun Law," one of the most idiotic laws on the statute book, amended so as to remove at least some of the objectionable features of it. The Sullivan law has been in force long enough to prove itself not only a failure but a positive help to the lawless elements against which it was intended to operate. Highway robbers, burglars and other criminals have continued to carry and to use guns in spite of the law and the number of shootings by criminals and toughs has been as great as ever since the Sullivan law went into effect. On the other hand hundreds of law-abiding and peaceful citizens who were the possessors of guns intended only for their own protection, were arrested by the police and punished under the law, while the lawless owners of firearms were not interfered with to any extent. The law was undoubtedly prompted by good intentions but it should never have been passed, as it could not be enforced in the proper way and in an effective manner and, for that reason, was bound to do more harm than good. How futile the law is was clearly illustrated the other day, when a boy of eighteen years, on his way to the house of his aunt, was made blind in both eyes by a pistol shot fired by some hoodlum who was practicing his marksmanship on the public street. The scamp who fired the shot was not arrested. After falling through an elevator shaft from the seventeenth floor of the new Municipal building where he was at work, John Brunnen, a marble worker, was found sitting in the basement at the bottom of the shaft, calmly lighting a cigarette which he had just rolled. Brunnen, who must be a man of iron nerve, had sustained fractures of both legs and probably internal injuries, remarked to the men who found him that he "must have had a close shave."

Thomas Stevens, 74 years old, a second cabin passenger who arrived the other day on a White Star liner, was sent to Ellis Island because he had no funds. He was born in England, but had lived in the United States thirty-two years. Two years ago Mr. Stevens went to Bristol to visit his brother, 84 years old, who was ill. Just before Mr. Stevens' arrival in Bristol his brother died and Mr. Stevens spent all his spare cash in paying for the funeral and a monument upon his brother's grave.
