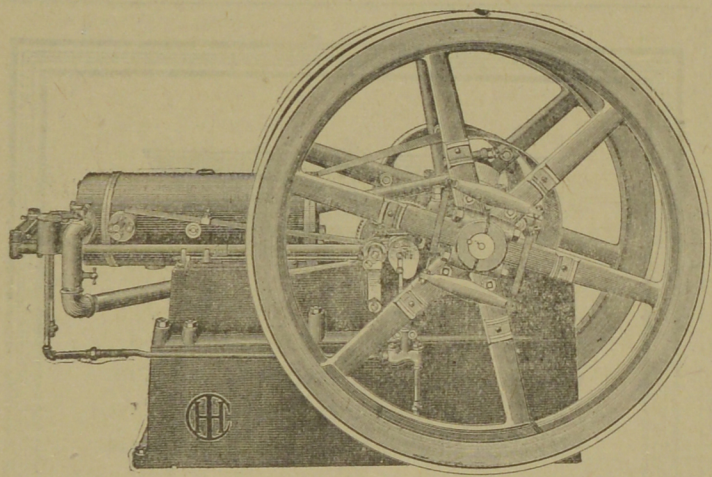

## RITCHIE TURNS

**DOWN McFARLAND'S  
WEIGHT TERMS**

## CHARLOTTETOWN

**VICTORIAS HOLD  
STARR TROPHY**

Cambridge Man Made New Broad Jump Record—Royalty Attended—Rhodes Scholars Competed

Charlottetown, P.E.I., March 14—That the Starr Trophy is likely to find a permanent resting place here, was conclusively demonstrated this evening at the Arena rink when the Victorias met and defeated the Amherst septette with a generous coating of whitewash, the visitors failing to score.

When the final bell rang the score stood 8 to 0 in favor of the Vics' seven. The visitors made a couple of changes in their line-up, and although they played a much harder game than on the previous evening, they could not go through the Victorias' defence.

## OXFORD AND

**CAMBRIDGE TIED  
IN TRACK MEET**

Representatives of the Two Fighters Met Yesterday But Failed to Reach Agreement

London, March 14—Oxford and Cambridge universities tied with five events each in their fiftieth annual athletic sports meeting, held at Queen's Club, London, today.

Oxford won the weight putting, the hammer throwing, the high jump, the mile flat races, while Cambridge carried off the 100 yards flat, the quarter-mile flat, the half-mile flat and the 120 yard hurdle races as well as the broad jump.

Cambridge, however, shone best, as the light blue H. S. O. Ashington made a new record at these sports of 23 feet 5½ inches for the broad jump and, but for a bad start, D. Grondon-Davies would easily have lowered the quarter-mile record. He was actually left five yards at the start, but a splendid spurt on the home stretch landed him the winner by six yards only 3-5 of a second outside the record.

It was owing to the assistance of the old Iowan, Wil A. Ziegler, who won the hammer throwing, and the weight putting, improving his previous records, that Oxford was able to tie.

Another American Rhodes Scholar, H. B. Stotz, of Leland Stanford, was placed second for Oxford in the broad jump, while E. P. Hubble, of Chicago was third in the hammer throwing and C. McCormick of Chicago, was third in the weight putting.

Cambridge also had an American student, F. Sproule, of Stone School, on its team. He tied for second place in the high jump.

King George and the Prince of Wales, the latter an Oxford student, were present, and there was an unusually large gathering of spectators in spite of the dull weather. The track was in good condition.

Louis P. Roth, a seargent in the United States army, has signed to umpire in the Wisconsin-Illinois League. If W-I. players try to start anything on the field this season it will be a case of "halt-about, face-double quick" to the club house.

## RESIDENT MUST PAY MORE FOR GAME LICENSE

In the Legislature on Friday Hon. Mr. Flemming introduced a bill to amend the Game Act, 1909. He said that the bill, while not a very lengthy one, contained some provisions of great importance. The first section provided that whenever the surveyor general is satisfied, and upon an examination of any of the streams of the province he found that a limited number of beavers can be taken without injury to the supply, he is authorized to issue a special license for the taking of such beavers, which license will be accompanied by the necessary tag or tags as prescribed by the Game Act, 1909, the fee for said license to be \$2.00 for each beaver so taken.

The prohibitive period for the capture of sable is extended under the provisions of this act until July 1st, 1916.

An amendment is provided to section seven of the act by making an addition which seemed to be necessary on account of a new condition which had arisen. The addition reads as follows:

"Notwithstanding anything contained in the Game Act, 1909, the surveyor general is hereby authorized at any season of the year whatsoever, to take any fur-bearing animal or animals for breeding purposes with the provision that those fur-bearing animals shall only be kept in captivity within the province. The surveyor general shall issue permits to capture such animals and is hereby empowered to fix and exact the necessary fee for such permit."

There had arisen a large number of requests to the department for permission to take fur-bearing animals alive and to keep them in captivity for breeding purposes. The number of such applications had grown very considerably within the last few months, the department is receiving many applications from parties desirous of taking mink and muskrat. One application that he had received asked for permission to capture twenty-five pairs of mink. While the department had received several of these applications last year, they refused them all because there was no authority in the statute to give such permission. But it seemed desirable that the government should encourage the establishment of farms for the breeding of fur-bearing animals in captivity, and the only way to cause that to be brought about is that authority should be obtained for the issuance of permits to capture the fur-bearing animals during the closed season. He was not prepared at the present time to state what amount the department should charge for these permits but the charge would be based on the quality of the animals and the number captured. He understood that the department in the Province of Ontario undertook to secure the animals and hand them over to the parties making the application, making a charge not only for the permit but for the cost incurred in their capture. In the case of beaver the department in Ontario charged \$50.00 per pair. Either the surveyor general must continue to refuse the many applications, or authority must be obtained to issue permits for the capture alive of fur-bearing animals for breeding purposes during the closed season.

Under this bill section twenty-eight of the Game Act, 1909, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:

"The surveyor general shall appoint one chief warden and it shall be his duty to supervise all wardens in the province and attend generally

to the enforcement and observation of the game, fishery and fire laws of the province.

"He shall report to the surveyor general at such times as by regulation or otherwise, he may be required so to do."

"The surveyor general shall also appoint a chief fire warden who will co-operate with the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada in the suppression of forest fires along lines of railway in the province and who will also work in conjunction with the chief warden of the province in the prevention of forest fires."

In enacting such a section he felt that the government was complying with the request of the Board of Railway Commissioners of Canada in connection with the fighting of forest fires along the lines of railways. One had only to make a trip along the lines of railways in the province and notice the miles and miles of destruction by fire to recognize how important it was that the forests should be protected as far as possible.

Sub-section (a) of Section 44 of the said act is hereby amended by substituting the word "three" for the word "two" in the last line of the said sub-section, which provided that the surveyor general might issue a license to hunt and kill big game to residents for three dollars.

Manager Bill Dahlen of the Brooklyn Superbas, believes he has copped a real star in Leo Callahan, the youngster who played with Elmira last season.

Word from the Giants' training camp at Marlin, Texas, has it that Manager McGraw intends to make an outfielder of Jim Thorpe as the Indian has shown some pretty nifty batting.

George (Dummy) Kinn, the former Columbus player who has been out of the game several years, will again don the spangles the coming season and play first base for the Akron Interstate League team.

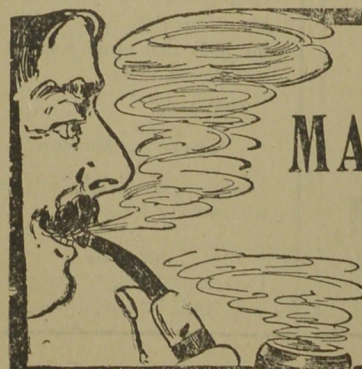
