NEWS FORECAST FOR THE COMING WEEK

Washington, D. C., March 15—The various steps of the new administration in the task of getting its machinery into smooth running order will continue for some time to attract the attention of the nation. Almost daily there may be expected the announcement of important appointments or changes among the heads of departments and in the diplomatic and other branches of the government service. At the same time committee meetings and conferences are to be held by the Democratic leaders in Congress for the purpose of disposing of preliminary business and agreeing upon the party program with reference to the approaching session for the revision of the tariff.

Secretary of State Bryan will be fifty-three years old Wednesday and the Democrats of Nebraska have arranged for a banquet to be given in his honor in Lincoln, at which Mr. Bryan will be the principal speaker.

Speaker Clark has accepted an invitation to visit Boston Monday as a guest at the annual celebration of Evacuation Day in that city.

Services on Grover Cleveland's birthday anniversary, on Tuesday, are to be held in Caldwell, N. J., to mark the falling over of the old paragon of the First Presbyterian Church, in which the President was born, and transforming it into a memorial library in his honor.

The centenary of the birth of the explorer, David Livingstone, will be celebrated during the coming week by the geographers of the world. One of the principal observances will be a great meeting in the Albert Hall, London, under the auspices of the Royal Geographical Society. Similar meetings are to be held in Scotland, the native land of the explorer, and in the United States, Canada and other countries.

The annual convention of the Cattle Raisers' Association of Texas, one of the principals gatherings of the year held by those interested in the live stock industry, will meet in El Paso Tuesday and continue in session three days.

Another convention of week will be the annual meeting of the National Hardware Dealers' Association which will assemble in Jacksonville Monday and continue through the greater part of the week. The sessions will be attended by leading representatives of the hardware trade from every section of the country.

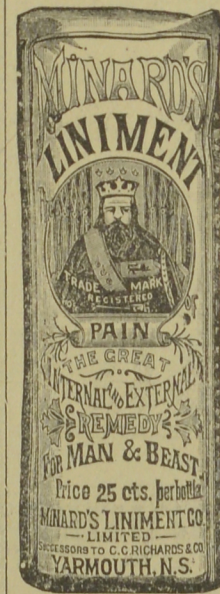

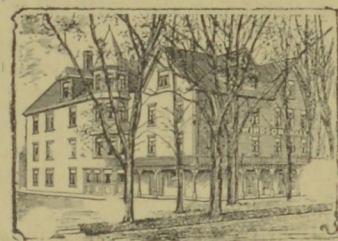

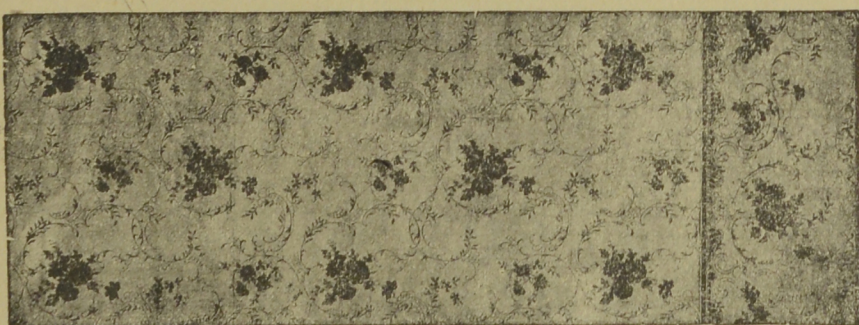
