## OPPORTUNITY FOR LIBERALS TO HELP ALONG THE CAUSE

May 7, 1913.

### TO THE LIBERALS OF NEW BRUNSWICK:

Efficient organization is the keystone of success in business or politics. The recognition of this fact and the request to their supporters to join in sharing the necessary expense brought success to the Democratic leaders and their party in the United States Presidential elections last year. The funds for legitimate party purposes, such as organization, printing, publicity and travelling expenses, were raised by a popular subscription.

The Liberals of New Brunswick are in need of more thorough organization, of committee work and wider distribution of party literature, for which purposes a considerable sum of money will be required. We believe all loyal supporters of the party will be ready and willing to subscribe to such a fund, and we ask them to do so.

The Liberals are today fighting in the House of Commons for free speech and the people's liberties. We do not know how soon they may be called upon to struggle for their rights at the polls.

We must be ready. The Liberal party must be ready and the only way to be prepared is to organize.

In asking the financial assistance of Liberals for that purpose we are inviting every member of the party to co-operate and stand shoulder to shoulder with us in this memorable struggle. We neither expect nor desire assistance from the trusts, or wealthy corporations, whose interests may clash with the interests of the common people, and this appeal is therefore made to the masses of the electorate, who desire to maintain the rights of the people. It is far more desirable in the interest of the party that the subscriptions should be general, coming from every parish in the province, in other words, that there should be a large number of subscribers for small amounts rather than a small number of subscribers for large amounts.

Subscriptions for any amount, from one dollar and upwards will be received by those in the different polling districts in the parishes who are authorized to do so, as well as by the County Treasurers, who will forward all amounts they receive directly, as well as those from parish collectors, to the Provincial Treasurer who will acknowledge the same.

The funds collected will be expended under the direction of the undersigned Provincial Committee representing the Liberal members from New Brunswick in the House of Commons and subject to the audit of Henry E. Hill, of St. Stephen.

## COLUMBUS BURIED IN AMERICA?

The remains of Christopher Columbus, discoverer of America, generally believed to be interred at present in Seville, Spain, are in reality in the cathedral of Santo Domingo, capital of the Dominican Republic, having been kept there by a ruse of the Dominican people.

This is the substance of a remarkable story brought to Washington by John E. Osborne, assistant secretary of state, who has just returned from a three-week trip to Santo Domingo and Haiti. He said he received his information directly from the highest officials of the Dominican government.

As a result of the discovery, Mr. Columbus Osborne has suggested that the remains of Columbus be placed on a battleship and carried through the Panama canal, when it is opened, as a tribute to the great discoverer of the western hemisphere. His suggestion includes the return of the remains to Santo Domingo following this ceremony.

The story told by Mr. Osborne by members of the Dominican cabinet, includes a remarkable account of how the remains of Diego, the son of Columbus, were exchanged for those of the great discoverer. The remains of Diego are those now in Seville, he said.

The popular conception of the disposal of the remains of Columbus, which is supported by the best authorities, is that the remains of Columbus and his son were originally interred at Seville, and removed to the cathedral at Santo Domingo in 1542 and removed to the cathedral at Havana, Cuba, in 1795. In 1898, following the Spanish-American war, the remains were supposed to have been sent to Seville again.

Mr. Osborne said that he had not only seen the real remains of Columbus, but that he had handled his bones and also a bullet found in his body after his death. This bullet is one of the main identification marks, he said, because Columbus was known to have had a bullet in his body at the time of his death.

The casket containing the bones has been removed from its original resting place, and has been placed in a special chapel, to which only high officials of the government have access, according to Mr. Osborne.

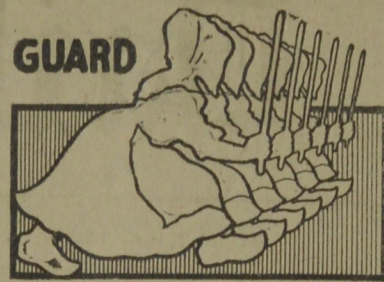
The principal distinguishing feature about the Columbus casket is an inscription on the bottom, Secretary Osborne said. The inscription contains the name "Christoval Colon," the Spanish for Christopher Columbus with the title, "first admiral and discoverer of America." Diego Columbus was known as the second admiral.

"After the funeral ceremonies at Valladolid, Columbus' remains were transferred to the Carthusian monastery at Santa Maria de las Cuevas, Seville, where the bodies of his son, Diego, the second admiral, were also laid. Exhumed in 1542, the bodies of both father and son were taken over sea to Hispaniola, and interred in the Cathedral of San Domingo. In 1795-1796, on the cessation of that island to the French, the relics were re-exhumed and transferred to the Cathedral of Havana, whence, after the Spanish-American war of 1898 and the loss of Cuba, they were finally removed to Seville Cathedral, where they remain."—Washington Star.

### DOG TAXES

The attention of owners of dogs within the City limits is directed to the following provisions of the City By-law relating to dogs:

"Every owner of a dog shall register such dog at the office of the City Treasurer on or before the FIRST DAY OF AUGUST in each year the tax or fee for each registration shall be ONE DOLLAR, which must be paid to the City Treasurer before registration."

"The owner of any male dog who has not registered it on or before the first day of August as aforesaid may register such dog at any time up to the first day of September next succeeding on payment to the City Treasurer a tax or fee of TWO DOLLARS; but if such registration is not made until after the first day of September and previous to the first day of January next succeeding the tax or fee for such registration shall be THREE DOLLARS."

The tax or fee for female dogs is fixed at FOUR DOLLARS if not registered before August first and at FIVE DOLLARS afterwards.

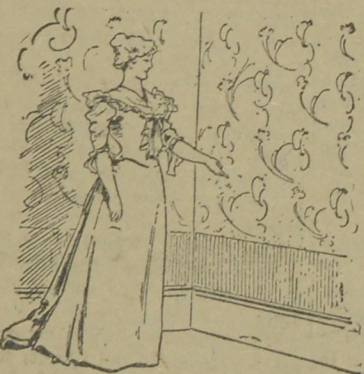
