MR. FOSTER'S EXCUSE

At his farewell to his North constituents last Monday, Hon. Mr. Foster declared "A quick and effective contribution is, the essential thing to do now is to put three fighting machines, the finest in the world, in the front line of the Imperial navy. Do not go away with the idea that by growing great Britain three Dreadnoughts and no men we are imposing a burden on the mother country. She will man the ships."

That is the best the Tories can think of doing now. Had they followed out the plans of the Laurier Government, Canada would by now have ships ready for service, built in Canada, manned by Canadians and maintained by the Dominion. It has been stated again and again by Churchill and Asquith that Britain has as many Dreadnoughts as she can effectively man. What is wanted is not a sudden jump into the lime-light with these spectacular gifts. A real working fleet unit so built that with natural development it will in time reach the Dreadnought stage would be much more valuable both to Canada's national pride and the Empire's security.

Further despatches from Ottawa seem to confirm the report that Edgar N. Rhodes, M. P. for Cumberland will soon be appointed to the position of Solicitor General. A passage from the Montreal Herald says, "Mr. Rhodes is Premier Borden's present choice for the position which has been vacant since the present government came into power, and it believed that the appointment will be made at an early date." The American News is quite confident that if Mr. Rhodes were elevated to this position that there would be no opposition against his return in Cumberland County. Mr. Rhodes was elected to the House in 1908 and was re-elected in 1911. During his five sessions in Parliament, he has taken a prominent part in debates and is recognized as one of the coming men in the Conservative ranks.

The announcement of the resignation of Dr. A. B. Atherton as chairman of the school board made in yesterday's Mail, was heard with regret by all classes of citizens. The doctor succeeded the late Dr. G. E. Coulthard as chairman of the school board in 1900, and has devoted a lot of time and energy to the work. Under his able administration the schools have steadily progressed and were never in a more efficient state than at the present time. The doctor has given unobtrusively of his time to the work and has performed a valuable public service which is appreciated by his fellow citizens. His successor in the chairmanship will likely be Dr. G. C. VanWart, who has been a member of the Board for fifteen years although the friends of Dr. W. C. Crockett are urging his claims.

Major Sam Sharpe argues from the experience of the United States navy that Canada could never get men for the crews of her own navy. The records of the American navy show that during the past five years over 1,000 men born in Canada and 234 actually living in the Dominion have joined Uncle Sam's naval service. Surely it would be far better to keep these men as Canadian citizens manning Canadian vessels instead of sending them to swear allegiance to Uncle Sam and serve in the American navy. And with Canadian ships to attract them it is certain that very many more would offer for the service.

The defeat of Bonar Law's Food Tax program as an incident of preferential trade has probably put a quietus to that program as it almost did to Mr. Law's Leadership with the Unionists. Since he cannot give Canada any preference upon grain and food stuffs he might give Great Britain a preference on grain

and food stuffs. Such an arrangement with a policy of contribution to the Imperial navy would be a triumph of Tory policy and help hasten the time when Canada would return to real Liberal progress.

It is reported that Mr. Pinder has selected a seat on the left of the Speaker for the coming session. He is going to make certain demands upon the government and if the same are not complied with, he will be saved the trouble of crossing the floors of the House. Mr. Pinder had the honor of leading the poll at the last election and he feels that he ought to have some say in the management of the ship of state.

If Dr. McNally had not taken the bull by the horns and smashed the "blooming barricades" which were put at the entrance to the Highway Bridge, the chances are that before this somebody would have taken a plunge into the air-hole near the Star Line wharf.

The Charlottetown Guardian the only morning daily on the Island has been purchased by a Conservative syndicate for \$40,000. Black fox magazines are said to have supplied most of the purchase money.

The government supporters in the New Brunswick legislature are for an increase in the indemnity from \$500 to \$700. It is evident that Tory loyal politicians place a high value on their services.

The report comes from Ottawa that a movement is on foot to increase the indemnity of senators and M.P.'s from \$2,500 to \$4,000.

Winter ice racing is becoming more popular than ever before in New Brunswick. As usual Fredericton takes the lead.

WORLD'S LARGEST BUILDING

The total cost of the building is estimated at about \$13,500,000 of which amount \$4,500,000 were paid for the ground. The building was erected for F. W. Woolworth, who was born poor at Rodman, N. Y., April 13, 1852, went through public school and a business college and in 1879 opened the first "Five Cent Store" at Utica, N. Y. The venture prospered, he extended his business to other cities and now has a chain of more than 300 such stores throughout the country, from which he derives an enormous income. More than one half of the capital required for the erection of the Woolworth Building was contributed by capitalists in France. The rent roll of the building is expected to be about \$2,500,000 a year.

scious with severe wounds in his head and Leen in a stupor. A 44-calibre rifle with one empty shell, the stock broken from the barrel was found on the floor.

This afternoon the coroner's jury gathered about the bed of St. Patrick St. John, who was hardly able to talk. He said a fight started between Leen and Foy and as he was trying to separate the combatants he received a blow over the head which stunned him. He heard a rifle shot but did not know who fired it. He had seven scalp wounds.

John St. John's testimony was about the same. He did not know who fired the shot nor did Charles Leen.

The coroner's jury had rendered a verdict that Foy had come to his death by a shot from a rifle in the hands of some person unknown to the jury. John St. John was placed under arrest by Sheriff Elmer Bryson of Arcoostook County and taken to the Houlton jail.

From the evidence given today it was not made clear whether the shot was fired by intent or accident. John St. John will be given a hearing this week.

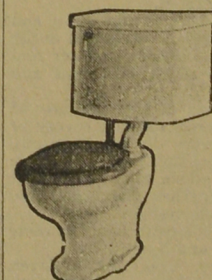
