The Amherst News is quite confident that if Mr. Rhodes were elevated to this position that there would be no opposition against his return in Cumberland County. Mr. Rhodes was elect; ed to the House in 1908 and was reelected in 1911. During his five sessions in Parliament, he has taken a prominent part in debates and is recognized as one of the coming men in the Conservative ranks.




