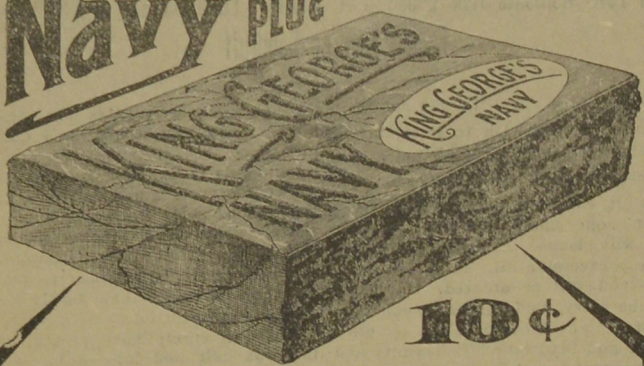

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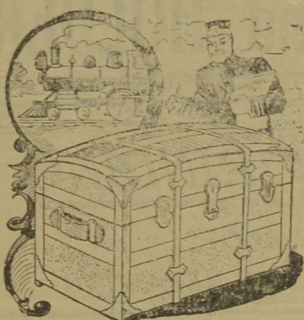

MIKE MURPHY PANNED OUT BY HALIFAX PAPER

Scrapping in New Glasgow-Crescents Game Caused Big Rumpus---Police Took Three off Ice

Wednesday's Halifax Chronicle gives Mike Murphy a great panning out for scrapping in the New Glasgow-Crescents game. The Chronicle goes at it thuswise:

"The New Glasgow Cubs were defeated by the Crescents last night at the Arena, by the score of five goals to three, in a game which was spoiled by an exhibition of rough house hockey in the second period, in which the brothers, Mike and Jim Murphy, of the Cubs, were the chief offenders. The three thousand spectators present, who had paid their money to see hockey, were treated instead to the most disgraceful exhibition of blackguardism ever witnessed on Halifax ice. At one time there was every indication of a free fight. Scores of spectators rushed on the ice and only the cooler heads prevented a mix-up. The police were slow in performing their duty. All the principals in the fight should have been placed under arrest and removed from the building. It was plain to everyone present that the Murphy brothers wanted fight and both of them repeatedly struck Scott. It was a case for the police to act, and for the magistrate to decide, not one for the referees to pass judgment. It is about time that those in authority should deal firmly with the principals in such an exhibition of rowdism. People who go to hockey games, especially the ladies, do not wish to witness such exhibitions as that of last night and the sooner that the team managers and the executive of the Hockey Association relegate this class of players to the benches, the better for the sport and all concerned."

THE FIGHTING MURPHY.

When Mike Murphy was fighting, his brother Jim, who was not playing in the game, jumped on the ice to assist his brother. Scott was the victim. He checked Mike Murphy, but it seemed a fair check from the side. Chester Gregory's stick then accidentally hit Murphy on the mouth and the latter, thinking it was Scott who struck him, made several lunges at the latter. It is to the credit of Harry Scott that he refused to fight with the New Glasgow player, even when Jim Murphy jumped on the ice and went after him. A portion of the crowd, indignant at the rough handling that Scott was being subjected to, jumped on the ice and Sergt. Northover and a couple of policemen escorted the fighting Murphys and Scott off. Both Mike Murphy and Scott were suspended for the remainder of the game. Both the Murphys should have been locked up for fighting. It is necessary that the I.P.H.A. take drastic measures to prevent a recurrence of such an exhibition. It was a case of history repeating itself with Mike Murphy. Apart from this disgraceful affair the game was a fine one. The pace set by the local men was very fast, and their combination work more effective than hitherto. It was Crescents all through the game. They led in the first period by the score of 3-1, in the second 4-2 and each side scored an additional goal in the final session.
