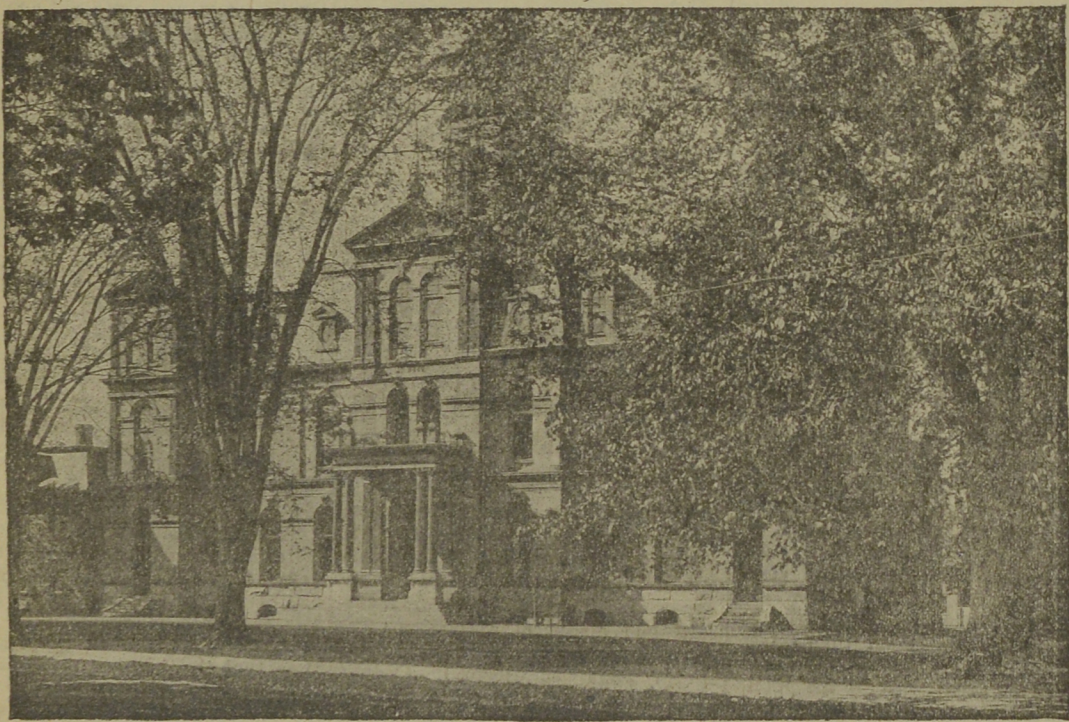

NEGLECT OF SETTLERS

The Victoria County News, a Tory  
paper, controlled by Mr. Titus J.  
Carter, M.P.P., recently published  
the following letter from "one of the  
interested."

Maple View, July 28, 1913.

Dear Mr. Editor:

As I notice in your columns, you  
are continually quoting The News as  
being a paper for the county, I venture  
to bring to your notice a matter  
concerning a considerable settlement  
in the upper portion of the county.

I always have been a strong sup-  
porter of the Conservative govern-  
ment but there is, I think, room for  
considerable improvement in their  
treatment of this section of the prov-  
ince. We hear so much nowadays of  
the new Farm Settlement Board in  
regard to new districts that it is a  
matter for comment that their efforts  
are not more largely directed to ame-  
liorating in some degree the lot of  
settlers in older sections. There is on  
the eastern side of the Tobique River  
and extending for several miles up  
the river, a tract of land which, for  
farming purposes, is, I venture to  
state, unexcelled in, at any rate, the  
northern part of the province, but  
which, owing to the fact of its being  
almost entirely shut off from the  
other settlements, is standing still, if  
indeed it is not going backward. Ex-  
cept during the winter when the river  
is frozen over and very occasionally  
in the middle of summer when the  
river is low enough for fording, we  
have practically no possible means of  
team communication with either  
Jorn or railroad.

Various petitions, which have been  
sent to Fredericton in the past in the  
hopes of getting a bridge, have been  
entirely ignored and we have not  
even the advantage of a ferry. So far  
as a road is concerned there is  
what may be termed a "trail" to  
Plaster Rock but for want of money  
spent upon it, it is almost impassable  
and it requires a very considerable  
outlay to make it a useful and ser-  
viceable highway, as well as changing  
the route to avoid certain hills.  
There are, however, various places in  
the settlement where a bridge can be  
constructed at a very reasonable fig-  
ure and it certainly seems hard that  
the farmers here should be so severely  
handicapped for the want of the  
very moderate expenditure required

to give them this means of access to  
town and markets. Owing to the iso-  
lation some grand lots of cleared  
land are lying idle and growing up  
again with bushes, while there are  
also numerous lots of wild land that  
would doubtless be speedily improved  
and cleared up were there any means  
at all of reaching a market for the  
produce.

I cannot help believing that if this  
matter were brought more prominent-  
ly to their notice, the government  
would do something to help us out,  
instead of leaving us, as we are at  
present, practically as isolated as  
convicts in a penitentiary.

Why cannot the Farm Settlement  
Board take up such a matter as this,  
and while making a good opening for  
new settlers, help out the older ones.

## A LAW

Be it enacted by the Board of Health  
of the City of Fredericton, as  
follows:—

1. Food products intended for hu-  
man consumption, and generally or  
frequently eaten without being cook-  
ed, and not enclosed in a natural in-  
edible covering or rind, shall not be  
exposed for sale within or out-  
side of any shop or other place of  
merchandise situate in the City of  
Fredericton, unless adequately pro-  
tected by a suitable covering from  
flies and other insects, and from the  
dirt and dust of the place of ex-  
posure or street, whereon such place  
is situate. This By-Law shall how-  
ever not apply to such food products  
exposed for sale in the Phoenix  
Square Market in the said City of  
Fredericton, during the hours estab-  
lished by law for the continuance of  
such market.

2. Dressed or partly dressed meat  
intended for human consumption,  
shall not be conveyed for commercial  
purposes over any street or highway  
of the City of Fredericton, unless effi-  
ciently protected by a suitable cover-  
ing from insects, dust, and expos-  
ure to the weather, and such meat  
shall not be exposed for sale where  
it is liable to such contamination or  
injury, unless so protected. The  
term "Meat" in this By-Law, shall  
be held to include Fish and all other  
food products of animal origin li-  
able to contamination or injury by  
exposure.

3. This By-Law shall come into  
force on the first day of August, A.  
D., 1913.

first day of July, A. D., 1913.
