FELT VERY MUCH
IN VANCOUVER

Joseph Wade, a Former Resident of Stanley, Here from Pacific Coast—Times are Hard There Just Now

Joseph Wade, a former resident of Stanley but for the past two years a successful lumber dealer in Vancouver, is in the city today. Mr. Wade intends to spend a couple of months visiting friends in this section. He left York County seven years ago, locating at Cranbrook, B.C., and five years later removing to Vancouver. Mr. Wade is at the Waverly Hotel today and in an interview with a reporter of The Mail, painted anything but an attractive picture of the present conditions on the Pacific Coast and in the west in general. Mr. Wade, in short, says that the financial stringency which the world is feeling has struck the west such a blow that no person at all well situated in this part of Canada should go there. The country will recover from the depression, however, for says Mr. Wade, "You can't keep that country back."

"There are men in Vancouver today," said Mr. Wade to the reporter, "who are worth thousands of dollars and yet who cannot raise a cent from the banks. Tight money has tied everything up solid. Building has been checked and that is the usual indication of progress in the west. I think however, that when the crops begin to move there will be a change."

British Columbia is a great country. That is the impression that Mr. Wade has gathered during his seven years' residence. The new railroads pushing through to the coast are

W. K. Feeney of Boston, Visiting City Collided with Carriage of Dr. Wainwright—Tried to Avoid the Boys

A number of young boys who were amusing themselves by running in front of automobiles, were the cause of a serious collision last night between a motor-car and horse and carriage. Fortunately no person was hurt but both carriage and car were damaged considerably. The accident occurred in York street, between King and Queen, the motor car of Mr. W. K. Feeney, of Boston, colliding with the carriage of Dr. S. F. A. Wainwright.

Mr. Feeney is an old Frederictonian, who is speeding his vacation here. He was driving his car when the accident occurred. He turned out of Queen street into York at about the rate of six miles an hour. Two or three young boys at the corner leaped out in front of his car, pointing their fingers at the lamps which were lighted. Fearing that he would run them down, Mr. Feeney swerved to the right side of the street instead of keeping to the left. In so doing he struck Dr. Wainwright's carriage coming in the opposite direction. Dr. Wainwright attempted to get out of the way but did not have time.

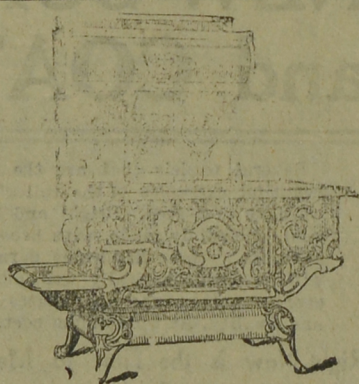
