AND ITS EFFECT**(Continued from page two.)  
as exporter, are apt to assume that  
we will get the advantage of the  
tariff, but we must not lose sight of  
the fact that the United States is  
placing iron ore on the free list in  
order that the iron and steel men of  
the country may get the advantage  
of free ore. If the Canadian export-  
er tried to absorb this advantage,  
competition with some other exporter  
would shortly demonstrate to him  
the futility of the attempt. The ad-  
vantage received by the importer  
would not remain with him. Compe-  
tition between various importers  
would keep profits down approxi-  
mately to the former percentage  
basis, so that the advantage would  
pass on to the consumer. This is  
one of the cases where one must use  
his imagination in order to perceive  
the reality. Imagine thousands of  
instances of this going on in all  
branches of industry and trade. Sure-  
ly the inevitable result must be a  
lowering of prices all the way round.  
Further, it means that wages must  
also come down.**RURAL SECTIONS SUFFER.**The effect of the extreme high tar-  
iff in the United States was to boom  
manufacturing centres and to estab-  
lish in the country, industries which  
have been a constant expense. The  
industrial centres drew on the rural  
sections for their employees. Farms,  
consequently, were abandoned, pro-  
duction became relatively less and  
food relatively dearer. As a result,  
wages had to advance. This means  
that the cost of the products of  
labor of all kinds again advanced.  
And so it went on. Now that the  
tariff is to be lowered, the order will  
be reversed, presumably, and in time  
we may see a "back to the land"  
movement. The final result would  
necessarily be that foodstuffs would  
relatively decline.Meantime, a considerable period  
must elapse before all the efforts will  
appear. In this interval, Canada  
will probably experience a consid-  
erably increased demand for various  
agricultural products. This demand  
will only appear when these products  
are cheaper in Canada than in the  
United States. We will, therefore  
have a situation which, if it con-  
tinued through any very extended  
period, inevitably compel Canada to  
lower her tariff. It would be intoler-  
able that Canadians, with the cost  
of living advancing in the manner in  
which it has been doing of late years  
should through maintaining the tar-  
iff against food stuffs, deprive them-  
selves of the advantage of cheaper  
food while watching the United  
States taking the opposite course. It  
does not seem possible that Canada

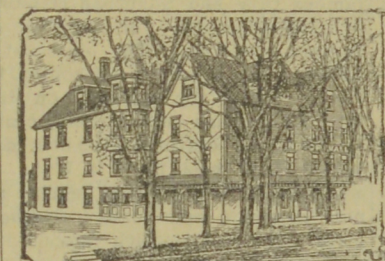

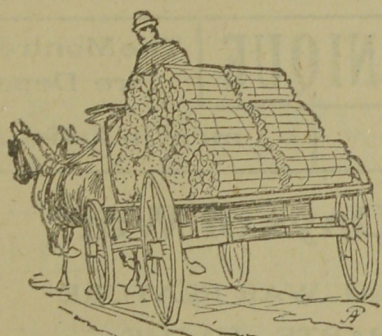
