NATIONALISTS THREATEN TO BOLT ON CLOSURE RESOLUTION

elected to make progress with Hon. Mr. Cochrane's bill to amend the Intercolonial and Prince Edward Island Railway employees' provident fund act. This measure is designed to enable employees dismissed for alleged political partisanship to withdraw their money from the fund, and its consideration gave rise to further discussion of the government's wholesale capitulation to the spoils system.

"It seems inevitable that this painful subject must occur from time to time," said Sir Wilfrid Laurier. "Every government is unfortunately subjected to much pressure to make dismissals, and every government must seriously and strongly regard its responsibility in this respect. Men suffer temptations upon both sides of politics, and it is a wise enactment which decrees that those who enter the service of the state shall cease to be political partisans.

"When charges are made, however, it is incumbent upon the administration to grant a fair and full investigation before taking action. I have few complaints to make in connection with the railway department but am sorry I cannot say the same thing about other departments. Any civil servant has the right to retain his office until he is convicted on unquestioned evidence after a proper investigation.

"The former government made only one exception to this rule, when a member of this house made the charge upon his own personal knowledge, such declaration from personal knowledge was deemed sufficient. The member was in this house, if challenged, and was required to make good his charge."

The Liberal leader took the ground that the moment an employee was dismissed for alleged political partisanship he should have the benefit of an investigation.

WHOLESALE DISMISSALS ON
I. C. R.

Mr. Chisholm, of Antigonish, pointed out that two out of every three

section men in his district had been dismissed. "The investigations," said he, "were a farce." He gave as an illustration the case of a section foreman who had been degraded with the purpose of forcing him out of the service, after many years of efficient service. He asked that this man be given the right to collect from the fund under the bill.

Hon. Mr. Cochrane gave no credence to allegations that the man had been degraded for political reasons, but promised to look into the case.

Hon. Mr. Graham took the ground that employees of the railway should have the right to serve as members of the school board or municipal council. As ratepayers, interested in the welfare and prosperity of their communities, they ought to have the same rights as their fellow citizens.

Hon. Mr. Cochrane said there was no rule governing such matters. Employees of the government railway had a perfect right to take part in municipal elections, but he was uncertain as to the wisdom of their serving upon municipal boards. "A man cannot be doing effective work in two places at once," said the minister. He had been asked three times concerning government railway men entering municipal life and had counselled against it each time. He had never, however, told any one who was serving that he must stop.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson thought that provincial matters should also be included in the minister's permission. These, after all, were akin to matters of municipal administration.

Mr. McDonald pressed for an intimation from the government as to whether the bill contemplated simply political partisanship in times of elections, or whether the conduct of a man, to whom he directed attention, who worked during the electoral interim in the preparation of voters' lists, also came under the decree.

Premier Borden said that in his view such a man came under the act, and Mr. Cochrane promised an investigation in the case in point.

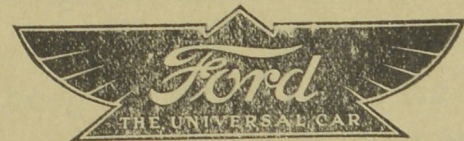
