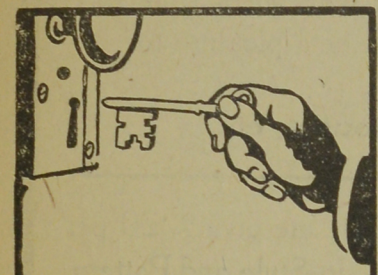

THE NEW U. S. TARIFF

(Continued from page three.)

would be competing with the United States on anything like even terms if the American had the advantage of eating Canadian food stuffs when they were cheaper than his own and the Canadian had to eat them himself when they were dearer. This is the situation as it will be after the United States adopts the new tariff.

If the conditions above described, namely, that costs will come down in the United States with the decline in the tariff—and about fifty million people on the other side of the border seem of the opinion that such will be the case—a new condition will arise here also. As it is now, Canadian manufacturers declare that American products are coming across the border in larger and larger quantities, and of course we know that this is the case. If the cost of production declines in the United States and is maintained in Canada, it is easy to see that the goods will come over in a regular avalanche. And so far as the cost of production in Canada is concerned, it would seem that one of the first effects must be, that it will not only be maintained but will go higher. As already stated, it is hard to avoid the conclusion that food stuffs must advance. The demand from the United States for iron ore, forest and farm products or whatever it may be, will surely cause the prices of these also to advance to some extent at least, all of which will make for the higher cost of production. If at the same time costs of production are reduced in the United States, I cannot see how we can avoid the conclusion that American goods will ever.

Under the circumstances described, we would be face to face with the problem of what to do about the tariff—a problem which, by the way, will continue at least as long as there is a tariff. On the one hand, will probably be the suggestion on the part of the manufacturer that the tariff should be raised to a high enough point to keep foreign products out; on the other, will probably be the counter suggestion that it be lowered to a point sufficient to reduce costs of production to a basis at which the Canadian manufacturer will be able to hold his own in such industries as are adapted to the country.

These, it seems to me, are some of the problems which Canadians will have to meet as a result of the lowering of the tariff in the United States. The final result will not be affected by bluster or spurious patriotism, or jingoism, or political campaigning. It is an economic problem from start to finish. The sooner the true solution is found the better.

To maintain Bill Boards.

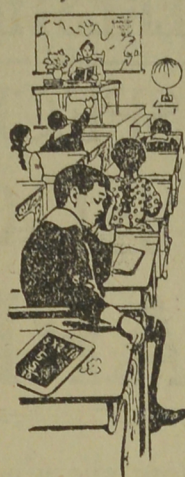

WILL BENEFIT THE CANADIAN DAIRYMEN

(Montreal Herald)

Country produce trade in Quebec and Ontario is interested in the proposed tariff reform on the other side of the line. If the measure goes through at Washington, milk and cream will go into the United States free, the duty on cheese will be just about cut in two, and that on butter will be cut in two, while on eggs the reduction will be from six cents to three cents per dozen.

EFFECT ON THE DAIRY FARMER

This is one case where, evidently, the farmer would profit, while the effect on the manufacturer of butter and cheese would be the adverse. Within easy reach of a dozen border American cities, a vastly larger market would be opened up to the Canadian farmer. That our dairy farmers would take advantage of the tariff reform is made evident by the fact that on butter and cheese a margin of several cents has prevailed on the other side over our market values.

A good market should open up for the farmer in the Eastern Townships and lower Quebec.

EFFECT ON FARMER

The effect on Canadian creameries and cheese factories promises to be the reverse under present conditions for two reasons: (1) We do not produce enough milk and cream for ourselves now. (2) The continued tariff on the finished articles will keep our cheese and butter out of the American markets, while the raw material goes in free of duty. Much milk and cheese will doubtless go past the local manufacturer. This is serious, because several thousand creameries and cheese factories have sprung up in Ontario and Quebec within the past few years, which must be fed. Canada's production is relatively at low ebb now. For home needs we imported butter heavily from New Zealand this last season, and more is on the way here. If conditions were normal and healthy our creameries would be making this butter, instead of importing. Of course, the root of the trouble is the shortage of milk cows, stocks of which have fallen off steadily in Ontario during the past few years. It is true that efforts are being made to renew the dairy industry in all parts of Canada, but until this is done on a large scale Canada promises to be an importer of butter, especially if a large part of our limited production of milk and cream goes across the line to the manufacturers over there.

MANUFACTURER'S MARKET NARROW

In the past despite a tariff of six cents per pound, Canadian merchants have found it profitable from time to time to export butter and cheese to the United States. This trade will likely be curtailed, in spite of the proposed change that will cut the duty in two. Best butter is selling in New York three cents above Montreal, and best cheese four cents above Montreal, but the American manufacturer has always the tariff advantage over us.

Of this earth here below.

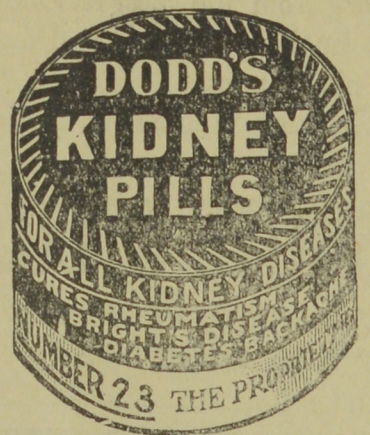
She's dead but not forgotten,

He can make our raw produce into butter and cheese and undersell us by three cents in the American markets. The only advantage that seems to accrue from the reduction in duty is to the American consumer. The American manufacturer may only charge three cents more than he could instead of six cents on the strength of the tariff. The bigger the tariff, the more the manufacturer can charge for his output. His possible margin of profit is lessened, inasmuch as the tariff is reduced.
