WITNESS SWEARS

RANTA SLASHED AT HIM WITH KNIFE

Row in Railway Camp at Dumfries Ventilated in Police Court This Morning---Assault on Three Persons Alleged

Paul Ranta, Finlander, who was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Timmins at a railway construction camp near Dumfries last Wednesday, appeared before the police court this morning charged with assault with intent to commit grievous bodily harm, upon railway employees named Craig, Crockett and Harrington. Mr. R. B. Hanson of Slipp & Hanson, appeared for the Hibbard Company Limited, in whose employ the complainants were. Mr. C. D. Richards of Crockett & Richards, appeared for the defence. Charles Crockett, a walking boss, who, under instructions from the Hibbard Construction Company, took over Ranta's sub-contract at Dumfries, was the only witness examined this morning. At one o'clock adjournment was made until 2.30. Crockett's testimony was that Ranta arrived at the camp on Tuesday of last week, having been in Fredericton the day before. He was under the influence of liquor and flew into a rage when he learned that his contract had been taken over by the Hibbard Company and the witness placed in charge of the work. He assaulted several men, struck the witness with his fist and slashed at him with a knife. The coat which the witness had worn was shown in court and a small cut made by the knife was seen in it. A large number of witnesses are here for the trial. Craig, who is one of the complainants, is said to have left the country and his case probably will be dropped.

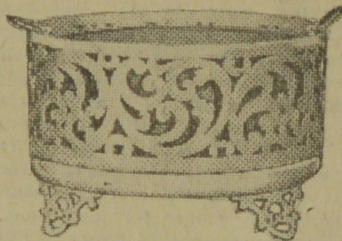
NASHWAAK DRIVES IS FAIRLY BRIGHT

Crews Now at Work on Landings--- Drive Will Start in Week---Little Snow But Much Ice In the Woods

Mr. E. B. Staples, manager at Marysville for the Partington Pulp & Paper Company has received some information that indicates a fairly bright outlook for the Nashwaak drives. Although there is little snow in the woods on the headwaters of the Nashwaak there is abundance of ice and if warm rains set in shortly the water will remain at a good pitch for driving. Landings on the Nashwaak headwaters have been at work on the ers since the first of the week. It is expected that driving will begin early next week. The cut on the Nashwaak for the past winter is estimated as being between 13,000,000 and 14,000,000 feet.

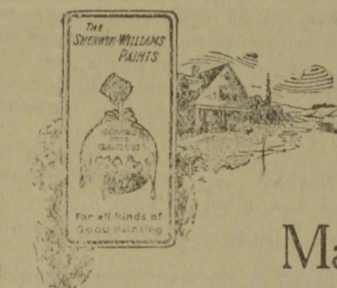
