Followers of the Vics, who looked for an easy win, became anxious, but shortly after the second period opened Moncton began shooting goals at will, and there was a feeling of relief. The Crescents in this period were simply played off their feet and Wortman in goal let nearly everything past him. The Crescents made desperate efforts to score but were unequal to the task, being kept busy guarding their nets.

In the third period Moncton scored once, leaving the final score 10 to 1 in their favor.

The game was comparatively clean, with the exception of a fistic encounter between McGregor, Mohan and Liffiton. McGregor and Liffiton were penalized ten minutes for the last scrap. Apart from these the penalties were few.

Moncton didn't play Harry Scott, as they were notified by President Lithgow that he would award the game to the Crescents if he went on the ice. In the face of this threat the Moncton management decided not to play the former Crescent player.

NEW YORK'S BIG DOG SHOW
