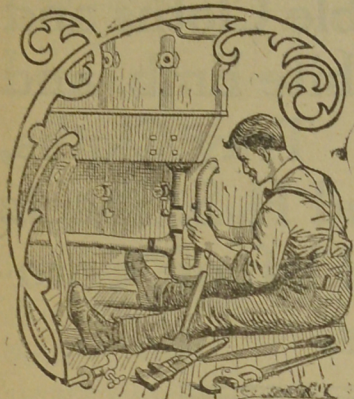

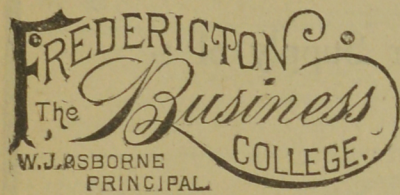

CALL CONFERENCE OF PROVINCIAL PREMIERS

Toronto, June 23—An inter-pro-
vincial conference is to be called

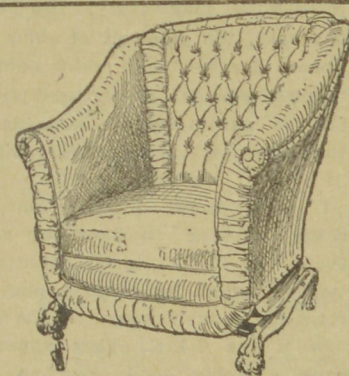

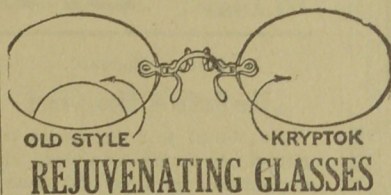

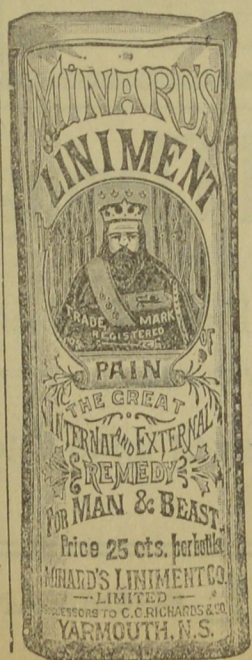
