SERVICES AT ST. JOHN.

(Telegraph.)

Feeling tribute to the personality of Rev. Dr. McLeod was expressed by Rev. Wellington Camp yesterday afternoon at a service held previous to the removal of the body from the home of the deceased. Rev. Mr. Camp spoke of his relations with the deceased and the deep impression he had left upon those he came in contact with. He was an ideal man, kind, sympathetic and a true friend. He had been one of the congregation of Leinster Street Baptist Church of which Mr. Camp was pastor and the latter said he always went to Dr. McLeod for counsel and it was given with the greatest cheerfulness.

Among those who were present at the service were Rev. H. R. Boyer of Fairville, who offered prayer, Rev. F. H. Wentworth, Rev. W. R. Robinson, Rev. A. J. Archibald, Rev. Dr. Archibald, Rev. F. S. Porter, Rev. M. F. McCutcheon, Rev. J. A. MacKeigan, Judge McLeod and Dr. G. H. Burnett, of Sussex, a very old friend of the family. The choir of the Leinster Street Baptist Church was present and sang two selections, "Nearer My God to Thee and Abide With Me." The body was conveyed to Fredericton last night, and interment will take place from the residence of his son, Hon. H. F. McLeod at 2.30 o'clock.

BAD ACCIDENT

as they left the steel. The engine and the first two coaches went ahead and stopped about 100 yards west of the wreck, but the colonist and immigrant coaches toppled over on the brink of the bank, and then rolled over. I rushed up the bank side of the track, but the car was then on its right side in the water. The cries of the injured and the shrieks of the unfortunate children were heart-breaking.

TRAIN BROKE IN TWO

These two cars broke from the others, the first class, which followed remaining partly on the railroad bed with its nose pointed towards the river. The tourist cars, which were next went to the side farther from the river and remained tilted at an angle about forty-five degrees.

The dining car left the rails but maintained practically in straight line, while the Pullman car, which was last, had only its front trucks off the rails.

All the houses in this section have telephones and messages were sent to the city for help. In almost incredibly short time there were many volunteers with automobiles, motor ambulances, doctors and nurses. As the cars were not demolished it was a comparatively easy matter to get out the injured, and they were immediately rushed in motor cars to the city hospitals.

The C.P.R. officials in Ottawa rushed medical men and others to possible and did nobly in caring for the scene of the accident as soon as the injured. Passengers who were able to continue their journey were taken west tonight on a special by way of Kemptville. Wrecking crews from Ottawa and Smiths Falls were promptly on hand and it is expected that the track will be clear for traffic early tomorrow morning.

The train for Toronto was also sent around by way of Kemptville. There was remarkably little panic among the passengers.

The Russians took things easy, while the British immigrants showed their breed by those who escaped or who were only slightly injured helping the less fortunate to extricate themselves. Those who were injured bore the most pluckily after the first alarming cries and their grit was commented on by physicians and others.

HAS CALLED IT OFF

Word has reached the city from Ottawa, through an official channel that the proposed Andover-Grand Falls section of the Valley Railway has been abandoned by the Government. Negotiations are now on for running rights over the Canadian Pacific Railway between the two points. An announcement that the road will use the C.P.R. rails from Welsford to St. John may be expected in the near future.

rooms. Among the places sought no place at all suitable for a lot of children seemed available. Space in the Y. M. C. A. hall was examined. Enquiry was made of Canon Cowie about a building on St. Ann's Church property; the old hose station now owned by Dr. McGrath, and the vacant Advent Church on Brunswick Street. In view of this condition of things some of the members felt it necessary in the public interest to purchase a vacant lot of sufficient size in the upper section of the city and erect another school building.

When Architect Brodie was in the city a few weeks ago the committee got him to look at the Charlotte St. School building with the view of enlargement. This he did and sketch plans were on the table showing very convenient additions which would cost about \$12,000. The objection was raised that the upper part of the city most needed extra accommodation. The whole matter was left with the committee to make further enquiry.

The contract with Mr. A. H. Farrell was recently executed and was approved by the Board. This id for making a complete change in the present sanitary plans at York St. School, and the contractor will be able to begin work when schools close tomorrow.

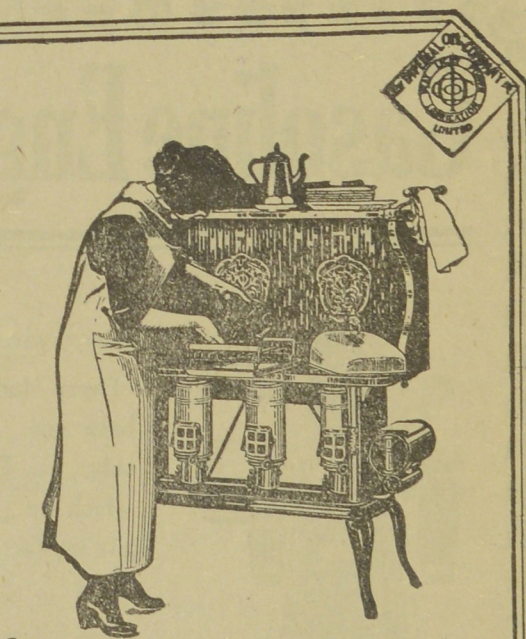
