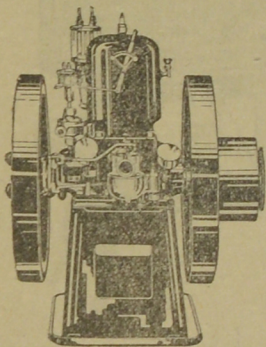

DAVE MOREY PITCHED HIS LAST GAME FOR DARTMOUTH TUESDAY

Wins From Amherst 3 to 2---Joins Connie Mack's Athletics July 1st---Boston Globe's Account

Hanover, N.H., June 24--Dartmouth and Amherst, the traditional Commencement Week rivals, met here today in their annual baseball game at Alumni Oval, and the former was the victor, 3 to 2.

The contest formed part of the Class Day program and the class of 1908, in Chinese garb, went through all the laundry processes, washing and ironing all available material and even one of the class members himself.

Their rivals, the class of 1910, in an attempt to outdo their predecessors, danced across the oval and then several of the "gondoliers" floated by the grandstand.

There was a big crowd present. The graduates marched to the field en masse and were assigned special sections for organized cheering.

Dartmouth started things in the first inning. Sullivan led off with a single and then "Red" Loudon made a circuit of the bases, making the longest hit of the season here and sending Sullivan ahead of him. Wanamaker singled but was out stealing second, although "Jiggs" Donahue clouted out a long three-bagger. The latter died at third.

Amherst got one run back in the third inning, Proudfoot making a single going to third on an error by Wanamaker and scoring on another error. Proudfoot singled again in the eighth and scored on Twitchell's error. Dartmouth came back strong in the eighth too, and there won the game. Wanamaker scored the winning run, taking first on a fielder's choice, stealing second and coming home on Bennett's hit.

Capt. Dave Morey, who joins the Athletics July 1, pitched his last game for Dartmouth, and it was one of the best. Had it not been for errors he would not have been scored on. He kept the visitors' five hits well scattered and was master of the situation at all times. His work and the batting of Loudon and Donahue featured for Dartmouth. Proudfoot excelled for Amherst. NEW MANAGER FOR THE BANGOR TEAM SAYS BANGOR NEWS

Several Possibilities Under Consideration---Frank Connaughton, New England League, Probable Selection

The Bangor News of June 25th has the following:

The directors of the Bangor baseball club have under consideration no less than three possibilities for a manager to succeed George Magoon. Frank H. Connaughton, the well known New England leaguer will be in Bangor today and have a talk with the directors. Coogan, who coached Bowdoin to the championship this year, after a long and successful career with Cornell, is also a possibility and Bobby Fitzmaurice, the well known New England leaguer, who turned out a fine team at the Massachusetts Agricultural college this year, also would like to come to Bangor.

Connaughton is the only one of the three who is in actual playing trim. He played all last season with New Bedford, at second base figuring in 113 games, at second base, with a batting average of .243 and fielding average of .947. Connaughton is widely known as well up on inside baseball and there is a feeling among the directors that he is just the man needed to steady the team and develop what is now a fine outfit of individual players. Both Coogan and Fitzmaurice are fine coaches as their work has proven.

If a deal is closed with Connaughton he will take hold of the team at once and probably work out with them today. It is expected that Bangor will play the Easterns at South Brewer, Thursday night.

Although the team did not win any games on the last trip, it showed some good baseball and there is no doubt but what a little tuning-up under the right kind of a leader will make a great improvement.

The fans are already hungry for more baseball and the man who always swears that he will not go to another game will be in the front seat for the game with Fredericton, for Friday and Saturday.

Bob Ganley's aggregation is a lively lot and will make it interesting and whether Bangor wins or not the games will be worth 25 cents.
