THE NATIONS OF THE WORLD
CLAMORING FOR CAPITAL

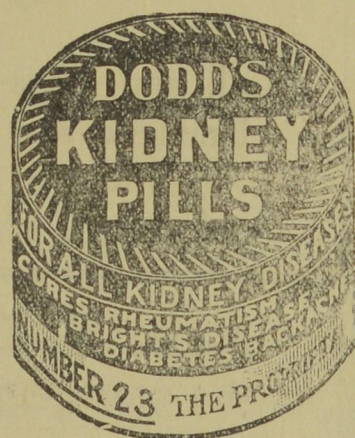
Montreal, June 23—The feverish anxiety of the money markets of the world, as well as the universal scramble for gold are focussing the attention of the best thought of civilized nations. The question is hourly asked how to assuage the acute monetary stringency. A little while ago some foolish political economists were deploring the plethora of gold coming from the mines of the world. The panacea for the high cost of living was, according to them, to restrict the output of gold. Now, all the nations of the world are face to face with an amazing gold and currency shortage. This shortage seems about to mar the growth and progress of all nations.

It is true that the world's gold production is greater now than the whole production of the eighteenth century but the world's commerce is a thousand fold greater than in any single year of the eighteenth century. The American colonies went to war with their mother country because George III insisted on levying some petty taxes on the American colonists. The tribute demanded would not have amounted to \$50,000 a year yet the very same people that refused to pay a tribute of \$50,000 one hundred and forty years ago are now paying a tribute of \$1,000,000,000 a year in interest and dividends to English investors.

It is marvelous to think that residents of Great Britain and Ireland draw as great a revenue from the United States as is required to run the government of the great republic. It looks incredible but it is true. The yearly appropriations of the American congress are about a billion dollars and the yearly tribute of American railways and cities and mines and lands and industries to British capitalists is to European capitalists, is over a billion dollars. How paltry the tea tax that set Boston aflame looks beside this colossal revenue paid yearly to British capital invested in America.

This fact should never be lost sight of when seeking a solution of monetary troubles. America pays \$500,000,000 a year of this tribute by trade balances and the other \$500,000,000 a year is reinvested in America, so that America's debt to England and Europe keeps growing at the rate of \$500,000,000 a year. Indeed, if the hundreds of millions spent in Europe by Americans be reckoned up and ocean freights be taken into account the reinvestments of European capital in America may be found to reach the colossal sum of a billion a year.

It is patent, therefore, that America's obligations to Europe keep growing on a colossal scale and that Europe has therefore the power to drain America of all her gold whenever more tempting fields for investment present themselves elsewhere.



England's power of the purse over America's money markets is portentous if not ominous. Americans have been borrowing and spending on a gigantic scale. Each year her banks and trust companies add a billion to their obligations. Thus, 100,000,000 of people each year assume a billion of fresh indebtedness to Europe and a billion of new obligations to America's own financial institutions. That is, two billions yearly of additional banking credits assumed through the marvellous business activities of the American people.

New Zealand and British Columbia and Argentina, Manitoba and Saskatchewan want gold and currency to finance their manifold activities and development. And now China is clamoring for gold and currency. She is awake at last with a school-master, a drill-sergeant and a newspaper in every village and her mighty and rich provinces are about to be gridironed with railways at the cost of billions and her wonderfully industrious people will soon be exploiting their wares in the world's markets.

China, under the leadership of Japan, will soon be turning out steel and ships and engines and dynamos at a cost that will appal the world. Knowledge, mechanical skill, learning, machinery and money are transforming the Chinese and the man is blind who fails to see the portentous development in the far east.

WILL WANT CANADA'S GOLD.

China will need all the billions of gold that Canada and the United States can spare. Once China secures a stable government she will prove a most tempting and most lucrative investment field and it is only a question of time when she will be a stable and enlightened government. But otherworlds are also awaking and from end to end of Africa the Britisher, the Frenchman and the German are rushing on the forces of civilization to new and as yet unheard of achievements. Civilization is marching with stupendous strides all through darkest Africa.

And this needs immense sums of money which will make it all the harder for South America and the Balkan States and Germany to finance their multitudinous needs and meanwhile Egypt and India are draining away about \$130,000,000 of gold from the civilized world and hoarding it and hiding it.

The wise statesmen and bankers of Europe and America were never happy till they taught the Felaheen and Nations—TWO—the Parsee that gold was better for hiding and hoarding than silver. The Sudanese and the Bengalese and other dusky toilers of the east have learned their lesson well and they are drawing away \$130,000,000 yearly of the civilized world's gold supply and burying it where it is worthless for civilization and useless for commerce.

A time will come when the yellow races will get just as hungry for gold as the dusky races of Egypt and India and when they do European and American statesmanship will have a far more gigantic problem to solve than that before them now.

WHOLE WORLD IS CLAMORING.

When bankers and financiers talk about lessening the world's activities and counsel slowing down on railroad and agricultural and factory development they forget that the whole world is clamoring for more necessities and more luxuries. The luxuries of our fathers are essential necessities for us. There is not beef enough, nor good, wholesome food enough, produced today to supply the frugal wants of the white races. The yellow races are learning the white man's tastes for beef and wheat bread. The American people are now greater importers of food products than exporters. Canada is not yet able to feed herself and has to get butter and mutton from Australia.

All the real statesmanship of the world should focus the thought and interest of the world's brightest minds on improved methods of farm production and improved methods for the collection and distribution of food products.

It should be clear to all far-seeing men that Canada and the United States must have all the capital they need to continue their activities and to keep increasing their food products as well as enlarging their manufacturing and mineral production China and Africa and South America must wait, for there is not money enough or gold enough or currency enough to go round.
