REMAINS OF REV.

DR. McLEOD

LAID TO REST

The Funeral Took Place This Afternoon From His Son's Residence and Was Largely Attended—Many Clergymen Pay Last Tribute

The mortal remains of the late Rev. Joseph McLeod, D. D., editor of the Maritime Baptist, who passed away at St. John on Tuesday, were laid to rest in Forest Hill Cemetery this afternoon. The funeral services were held at the residence of Hon. H. F. McLeod, son of the deceased and while simple in character were most impressive. Rev. J. E. Wilson was the officiating clergyman and had the assistance of Rev. Dr. Cutten, president of Acadia University, Rev. J. H. MacDonald, formerly pastor of the Brunswick Street Baptist Church, but now of Ottawa, Rev. H. R. Boyer of Fairville, Rev. H. H. Ferguson of Gibson and Rev. Dr. Smith of this city.

There were addresses by Rev. Dr. Cutten and MacDonald, both of whom referred in eulogistic terms to the life and character of the deceased and spoke words of sympathy to the bereaved relatives.

A quartette composed of Mr. F. L. Cooper, Mrs. F. A. Good, Mr. F. B. Smith and Mrs. F. L. Cooper rendered the beautiful hymns, Nearer My God to Thee, Abide With Me, and Forever With the Lord in a most impressive manner.

The service over, the long funeral cortege was formed and slowly wended its way to Forest Hill Cemetery, where interment was made.

The pall bearers were Rev. Dr. Cutten, Rev. Dr. MacDonald, Rev. H. R. Boyer, Rev. Mr. Wilson, Rev. H. H. Ferguson and Rev. Dr. Smith.

The chief mourners were Hon. H. F. McLeod, Norman P. McLeod, J. Fred Boyer, J. McLeod Boyer, Blanchard Fowler, F. Mersereau, W. J. Scott and O. S. Crockett, M. P. Following the mourners came the members of the Fredericton Ministerial Association, trustees and deacons of the George Street Baptist Church, staff of the departmental building, delegates representing the Loyal Orange Lodges and the general public.

PRISONER SCOTT

HAS A COUSIN

ON THE JURY

R. B. Hanson, Crown Prosecutor in Criminal Case Raises an Interesting Pt., in Circuit Court—Judge Made No Ruling and Case Goes on

The evidence in the case of The King vs Joel S. Scott was concluded yesterday afternoon. The prisoner occupied the stand for considerably over an hour and emphatically denied the charges alleged with all attendant circumstances. The last witness called was Dr. C. P. Holden, who was put on the stand to rebut medical testimony offered by the defence. All the evidence being in, the jury were allowed their liberty last night under caution not to discuss the case outside of court. This morning Mr. P. A. Guthrie addressed the jury on behalf of his client, making a strong plea for acquittal on the ground that the evidence adduced by the prosecution

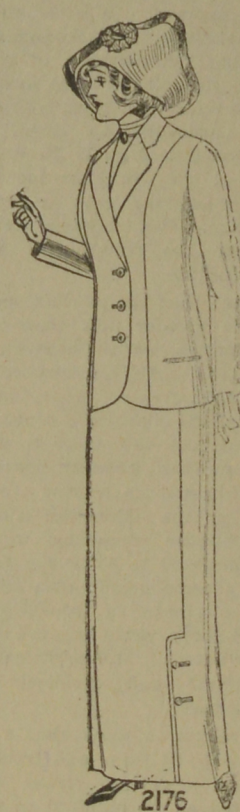

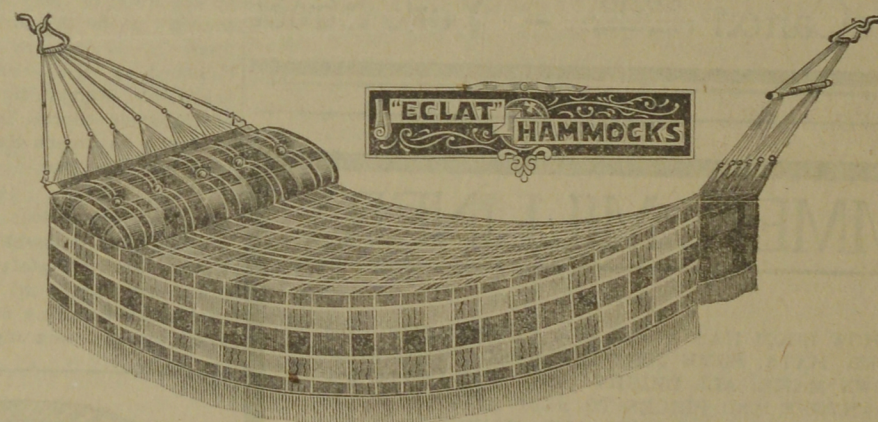
