take place on Thursday afternoon from the residence of his son, Hon. H. F. McLeod, in Fredericton. Accompanied by the family, the body will be taken tonight to Fredericton.

### HIS CAREER

Rev. Joseph McLeod was a son of the late Rev. Ezekiel McLeod, Baptist minister, founder and editor of The Religious Intelligencer, Fredericton. He was born in St. John, June 27, 1844, educated at the public schools, Baptist Seminary, and the Baptist Institute, Fredericton, and had the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity conferred upon him by Acadia University in 1886. He was married in 1863 to Miss Jean Fulton Squires, and in the same year was ordained and became pastor of the Free Baptist Church, Fredericton. He was made chaplain of the New Brunswick Legislature in 1875 holding the office for over twenty years. After retiring from active work in the ministry in 1890, Dr. McLeod devoted most of his time to journalism, succeeding his father as editor of the Intelligencer, which paper, together with the messenger and Visitor, was afterwards amalgamated with the Maritime Baptist, of which he was made first assistant editor, and since 1909 editor-in-chief.

In 1893, Rev. Dr. McLeod was appointed by the Dominion Government a member of a commission to enquire into and report upon the liquor traffic and the feasibility of a prohibitory law. As a member of the commission he visited every province in Canada and many of the states of the Union. The Commission reported against prohibition but Dr. McLeod, submitted a minority report in which he emphatically declared that the time was ripe for prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor in this country.

Mr. McLeod was one of the leaders in the Baptist church in the maritime provinces, and has held a number of offices including the presidency of the Baptist conference, to which he was several times elected he was also a foremost figure in the work of moral, temperance and political reform, and one of the promoters of the Canadian Baptist Union which was organized in 1908. Dr. McLeod being a member of this organizing committee. He was a delegate to the World's Baptist Convention in England in 1905, and was for a long time vice-president of the Dominion Alliance.

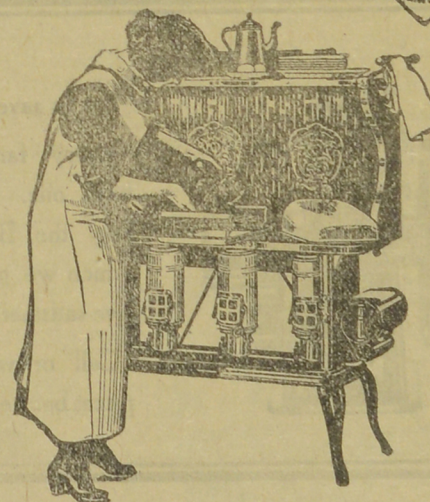
