BRITISH SAILOR HAD TOUGH EXPERIENCE

New York, June 21. The log of the Mary McGregor, British bark, 700 tons register, has an entry that relates to the death of a young man, James Wilson, the second mate. To all intents and purposes James Wilson is drowned. He went overboard, he sank and despite all efforts his body was never recovered. The drowning occurred on April 15th so that, according to the ship's log, Wilson has been drowned well nigh two months.

T O SHIP "LOST" MAN.

James Wilson, late second mate of the British bark Mary McGregor, and now listed as a victim of the sea sailed aboard the Vestris of the Lamport & Holt line for Rio Janeiro shortly before midnight last Saturday. In the harbor of Rio the Mary McGregor is awaiting a cargo and in a few days her late lamented second mate will step aboard from ghostland.

Few sailormen have had a worse and at the same time more fortunate experience than James Wilson, six feet and more, seamen. The Mary McGregor was heading across the South Atlantic from Port Elizabeth to B. A. (Buenos Ayres.) A south-east gale sprung up just before midnight on April 13, and in a few moments the bark was pitching like a rocking horse. Word was passed to shorten sail and like monkeys the crew scrambled into the rigging.

The gale increased in violence, while the men aloft tugged at the sails. With his eyes watching every point on the vessel, Wilson saw two hands struggling with the main top-sail. The blast of the storm was too much for them and they let the canvas get away from them. With an oath the mate sprang into the shrouds and went aloft with the ability of a cat-climbing a mast. A few slashing orders, a few violent jerks and the flapping sail was under control.

Then, when the danger was passed, Wilson reached for the shroud and missed his grasp. The next moment he was plunging down into the darkness, down into the maw of the wild maze of tumbling and roaring waters. A wild scream and the noisy waves closed over him and the bark went rushing by like a joy-riding automobile. Perhaps his absence was noted and an effort made to hoist and lower a boat. Perhaps they did not miss him in the din of the storm until it was too late to attempt to aid him.

All through the dark night the sailor man struggled in the seething sea. He divested himself of his coat and swam and floated in the turbulent waters. When day broke the waves were sobbing themselves to sleep, their temper broken and their anger passed. And all day long the rays of the sun blistered his face and the cold waters cramped his wearied limbs. But that brought to the

hardy man no fear. He kept himself up and maintained the circulation of his blood by his exertions.

But the birds of the sea swooped down upon him like vultures of the plains. They were big albatross. The knew not the nature of the struggling sailor. They pecked at his bare head. They rushed against him like savage animals and opened his scalp. In vain he shouted at them and fought them off. Again and again they returned to the attack. Wilson's head was cut and bleeding but he was fighting for his life and the plucky sailor held up to the last.

PICKED UP BY TRAMP.

As the afternoon began to wane, Wilson sighted the smoke of a steamer. As time passed he saw that it was heading directly toward him. His exhaustion fell from him like a mantle. He was a new man. The thought of rescue gave him new strength. Then the steamer was almost upon him. He saw a boat being lowered and pulled toward him. Hands grasped him by the arms and then he lapsed into unconsciousness.

Several hours later he regained his senses and found that he had been picked up by the tramp steamer Orlos, bound for Para, Brazil. At Para Wilson took passage on the Kincent of the Booth line and so arrived in New York. Here he found that the Mary McGregor was lying in Rio and he sailed on the Vestris to rejoin his command.

"I have been at sea almost twenty-two years," said Wilson, "but I've never had a worse experience nor ever heard of any one else who has had a worse one than that which I have lately been through. But I want to say that I never gave up hope. I've heard tell of men who have fallen overboard that reconciled themselves to their fate after a certain length of time but I don't believe it. As long as there is life and a fighting chance no man gives up hope. But, say, I'm going to be somewhat of a surprise when I step aboard the Mary McGregor and say, 'Good morning, captain.'"

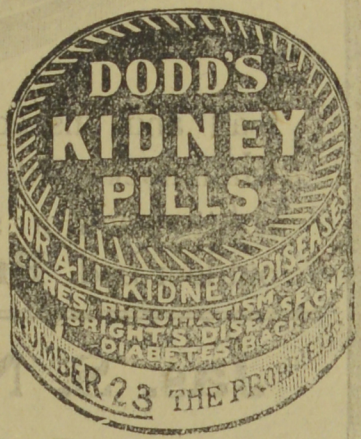
