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INTERVIEW WITH
MR. GUTELIUS
NOT CONSOLING

Told Board of Trade That Nothing Had Been Decided Upon in Regard to G. T. P. Connections With This City

The interview which a Board of Trade delegation had with Minister Cochrane and General Manager Gutelius of the I.C.R., here on Tuesday, was not as satisfactory as many would have wished; in fact, it was somewhat disappointing. The delegation made a strong bid for better railway facilities at this point and they spoke optimistically in regard to the increase of traffic which is expected to result from the new lines of railway being built in this section. One of the delegates in urging better accommodation here, mentioned the report that the Grand Trunk Pacific was to be extended to this city by way of Napudogan, he of course taking it for granted that the reports

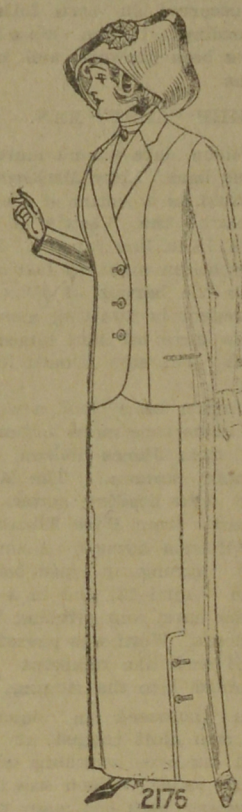

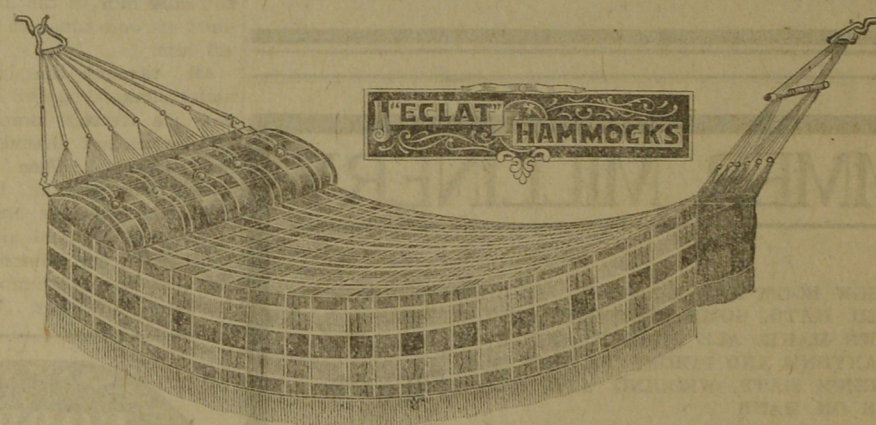
