Fultz, president of the fraternity asserted that he regarded the matter as purely a business transaction between Cobb and President Navin and that it was not only unfair but silly to attack the fraternity for not settling it.

However, the crowd seemed glad that the bout came to a sudden stop, for Britton demonstrated that he could hit Moore when and where he pleased. That he did not hit him oftener and harder was because he did not care to make a shorter bout of it.
