FREE FERRY SERVICE TO BEGIN THIS AFTERNOON

Members for York Act in Matter--- Public Works Dept. Makes Arrangement---Crossing on Foot on Bridge by Saturday

H. M. Blair, Secretary of Public Works for the Province informed The Mail today that arrangements had been made for the establishment of a ferry service for foot passengers. The ferry will ply between the City Hall wharf and St. Mary's beginning at 4 p.m. and will make her last trip at 8 p.m. until the Highway Bridge is available for foot passengers. The ferry will be in operation each day from 6.30 a.m. till 8 p.m. W. D. Gunter's gasoline launch will perform the service. It is the intention to have trips made every half-hour.

The members for York in the House of Assembly are in the city today and this morning among other matters considered the establishment of a ferry service.

For some days past a rowboat has been ferrying passengers between St. Mary's and the city and yesterday George Foss of Gibson placed a gasoline boat in commission. The free ferry service will put the private ferries out of business it is expected. D. C. Burpee and Son who are building the temporary span of the Highway Bridge have the piling pretty well completed and it is expected that the bridge will be available for foot passengers by Saturday. Floor beams are now laid on part of the span. There is to be a single roadway traffic being regulated by the caretaker of the bridge.

Mr. John W. Doty of Montreal, representing Foundations Limited, which firm is to build the new pier for the draw-span in the city and this morning in company with Secretary Blair and Engineer W. R. Wetmore visited the bridge. It is expected that with the subsidence of the spring freshet an attempt will be made to raise the sunken draw span which at present forms an obstruction to navigation.

FIRST BANK-LOGS TO ARRIVE TODAY AT SPRINGHILL

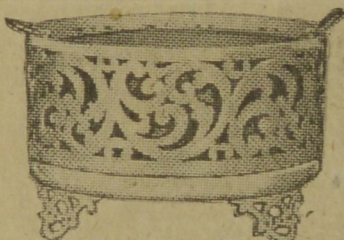
Consigned to James M. Scott--- Craft From up River Arrived Here This Morning From Queensbury

The first bank logs of the season are due to arrive at Springhill this afternoon. They are for James M. Scott of this city and consist of two rafts. The cut this year as far as bank logs are concerned is very much reduced. This is due largely to the fact that farmers along the St. John River between Woodstock and Fredericton have been turning their attention to other matters than the cutting of logs on their land in the winter. Railroad construction is also responsible to a certain extent for the falling off.

The first craft to arrive from up river points came in this morning from Queensbury, being the motor-boat of Alex. C. McNally of that
