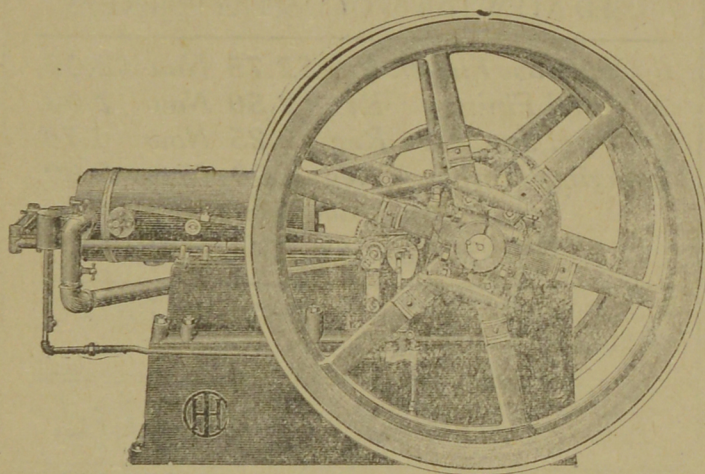

### N. H. A. CHAMPION CLUB HAS HAD LONG RECORD

Quebec to the Fore in Hockey From Earliest Times--Formerly Had Strong Amateur Team

(Quebec Chronicle.)

Quebec Hockey Club is one of the oldest in Canada, having been in existence since 1880. It was one of the clubs which formed the Amateur Hockey Association of Canada and played under the old challenge system. It has formed part of every big hockey league since and when the senior amateur league gave way to the professional league as the foremost hockey organization in Canada, Quebec moved with the other leading clubs and joined professional ranks.

WON CHAMPIONSHIP IN 1904.

A few years previous to this, however, viz., 1904, Quebec won the senior championship with a team entirely of Quebec boys. This team was an all-star aggregation. The splendid exhibitions between the Quebec and Montreal Victoria clubs of that year are still fresh in the minds of hockey fans. There was not a weak spot on the Quebec team and their defence men were as dangerous on the attack as the forwards. The team of that year was as follows:

Goal—P. Moran.  
Point—Art. Leader.  
Coverpoint—Ed. Hogan.  
Rover—Herb. Jordan.  
Centre and Captain—Charles Stanley.

Right Wing—Ed. Garneau.  
Left Wing—Joe Power.  
This was the only amateur Quebec team to win the senior championship but both before and since Quebec won hockey fame, and even in the club's worst years they frequently took a fall out of the leaders.

In 1896 the Quebec team was the only one to win a match from the famous Winnipeg Victorias during that club's victorious tour.

FIRST INTRODUCED HOCKEY IN UNITED STATES.

The Quebec club was also one of the first of the big league Canadian teams to cross the border to teach the Americans Canada's national winter game, which has since become popular in the United States. It was Mr. J. K. Leonard of Quebec, who conceived the idea while visiting Baltimore, Md. He broached the matter to the Baltimore rink people and returning home, completed arrangements and took the Quebec club to Baltimore for a series of games. The playing of the Quebec club caught the fancy of the Americans immensely and the popularity of the game spread to various big American cities, which now have leagues of their own.

ADVENT OF PROFESSIONALISM.

The advent of professional hockey a few years ago brought heavy financial obligations and it was felt by not a few that Quebec would hardly support a team that would be able to make a creditable showing against the other clubs, in view of the extra heavy expense and the fact that the rink accommodation was inadequate. Indeed, this feeling prevailed to such an extent that Quebec was not represented in the big league during the season of 1909-10.

But Quebec is a hockey city and the hockey loving public clamored for a team back in the ranks, shoulders were put to the wheel and Quebec made the plunge. It was a hard row to hoe, however, and those whose optimism and enthusiasm would not be downed are deserving of every congratulation for the success of they have achieved.

This year the club had to face a serious handicap when the Patrick brothers succeeded in carrying off three of the best players. But the executive went to work with courage and determination and in this they were helped out by the unselfishness of Paddy Moran, Joe Malone, Joe Hall and Jack Marks, who resisted tempting offers from other sources and stood by their last year's team. As for Joe Hall, he not only came himself but was the means of Quebec's securing such good men as Crawford, Mummery and Creighton. These with Tommy Smith, one of the cleverest forwards and most dangerous shots in the N.H.A. today, constituted a team of the pluckiest kind and it is thanks to them that Quebec has made so phenomenal a record of wins this year.

Great praise should also be given to the Quebec executive and especially to Mr. Quinn, who has worked so conscientiously for the team. In this he has been backed up by a devoted committee numbering among its mem-

## Four Teams for N.B. & Me. League are Probable

Conference Here Last Night Between D. B. Donald and Frank Leonard of St. John and Number of Local Baseball Men--St. John, Bangor, Calais-St. Stephen with Fredericton Would Make Circuit--Requirements for Local Team

Messrs. D. B. Donald and Frank Leonard, representing the St. John baseball interests, arrived here last night and had a conference with local baseball men with regard to Fredericton being represented in the New Brunswick & Maine League in 1913. From this city the St. John delegates go to St. Stephen tonight, their intention being to have steps taken to have a St. Stephen-Calais team entered. The teams that are now assured are St. John and Bangor. A Fredericton team and a fourth from St. Stephen and Calais would complete the circuit.

LOCAL REQUIREMENTS.

A local man who was largely interested in the Fredericton team in 1912, stated this morning that to assure the entrance of a Fredericton team in the league, the people of this city would have to show that they desire to be so represented. The rock-bottom requirements for the entrance of a team are (1) subscriptions to the extent of \$1,500 at the beginning of the season, (2) free grounds on which to play, (3) a weekly half-holiday, on Thursday preferably. The most important requirement of all is the cash subscriptions or guarantee. Last year much hard work fell upon the shoulders of the team's executive and it is desired that that should be lightened. In this connection it should be remembered that there still is money owing for the season of 1912.

THOSE AT CONFERENCE.

Those at the conference at the Queen Hotel last night, besides Messrs. Donald and Leonard, were J. J. McCaffrey, Hugh Calder, James P. Farrell, W. S. Hooper, J. D. Black, Edward O'Connor and T. S. Wilkinson.

Messrs. Donald and Leonard are optimistic with regard to the formation of a league and feel sure the project will go.

ORGANIZED BASEBALL.

Messrs. Donald and Leonard are in the city today and are employing the time by interviewing a number of local men who are interested in baseball.

"Mr. Leonard to The Mail's sporting editor today said: "The New Brunswick and Maine League this year is to be in organized baseball and will be under the National Agreement. Under that system each club will have a franchise and that franchise will have a commercial value. Under that system also players and umpires will be disposed of by draft. Clubs which dispose of players will be able to get money for them and if the league lets an umpire go to another league it will receive money for him. I think matters look encouraging here and in St. John. As far as Bangor is concerned, if the other clubs of the league are willing, a team can be placed there."

### KING'S COLLEGE

WINS INTERCOLLEGIATE HOCKEY TITLE

Beat Acadia 7 to 4 at Windsor Last Night--Game Was Fast Throughout

Windsor, Feb. 28--The rink was crowded here tonight with an excited crowd of spectators to witness the struggle between Kings and Acadia colleges in the intercollegiate hockey match which resulted in a score of 7 to 4 in favor of Kings. The game was played in two periods. In the first Kings scored two goals and Acadia one. After ten minutes the struggle was intense and several hot shots were sent into both goal-keepers but neither side scored. Then J. Harley got the puck and shot a swift one that eluded Acadia's defence. The fans howled with joy and nearly went wild when he repeated the trick and counted two for old Kings. Five minutes afterwards Acadia got first goal and their only one in this period. During the remainder of this half both teams gave several exhibitions of good hockey, Acadia doing the most, but there were no further scores made. The half ended 2-1 in favor of Kings.

Two hundred students came down by special train to Windsor and during the intermission the college fans kept the enthusiasm up to a white heat by college yells, tin horn music and college songs.

The second half started with a rush. Acadia claimed a goal and after a slight dispute it was allowed and the score was tied. Then Acadia scored again and three minutes later Wilcox made a wing shot and evened things up once more. Then Harley faced off and rushed in another and then the score was four to three in favor of Kings. One of the Acadia players got hurt and held up the game for a short time. When the game started Dupuy got the puck and making a brilliant play rushed in the fifth for Kings and one minute after J. Harley pocketed the sixth. Then G. Harley found Acadia's net and got the seventh. The game got a little rough and Harley and Porter were sent to the cooler for five minutes. Dupuy was put out for tripping and in the last minute Acadia scored their fourth, while he was in the box.

The American Horse Breeder Futurity will be one of the features of the Grand Circuit races at Rockingham Fair.

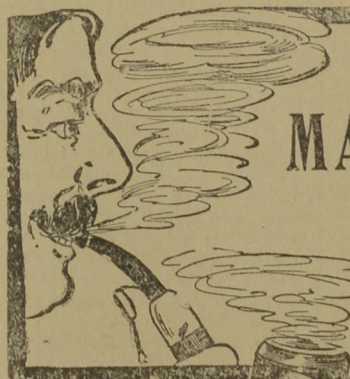
